**OPENINGS FOR WOMEN IN THE DOMINION**  
 Englishwoman Gives Her Experiences as Home Help

London, March 6.—Much interest was shown in the address delivered by Ella Sykes today before the Royal Society of Arts concerning openings for educated women in Canada. Miss Sykes was so anxious to find out what openings existed that she spent six months in Canada as a working woman, took five temporary positions as home help in four provinces, and received hospitality at chicken ranches and prairie farms. At the outset she met a rebuff at Winnipeg, where she was told "what a pity English women are so seldom trained to do anything properly." Miss Sykes said this was humiliating, but true. She was surprised to find how low accordingly was her market value. When she thought of being home help she found the reality very different from what she had imagined it. The Canadian is a capable housewife, and the work of keeping her home in good order seemed endless. Her experiences in several situations convinced her that the post of home help is unsuitable for educated English women, except perhaps on the Pacific slopes. Miss Sykes recommended educated English emigrants to consider to become probationers in large western hospitals, elementary school teachers, stenographers or dress makers. Poultry farming was lucrative if women could do the work themselves. "We are accused of wishing to drain the United Kingdom of all its capable women," concluded Miss

**SUFFRAGE TRAMP: MONTREAL TO OTTAWA**  
 Some Women Talk of Pilgrimage to Present Petition to Premier

Montreal, March 6.—Some of the members of the local Woman's Suffrage Association are talking of a suffrage tramp from Montreal to Ottawa to present a petition in favor of the equal franchise to the Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden, according to reports in circulation here today.

The women believe the march of the United States army of enthusiastic suffragettes from New York to Washington has been quite a success. Although the papers have featured in their head lines the fact that the army was at times slightly footsore and rather weary, the suffragists believe with famous advertising men that "every knock is a boost," and see only the advantages derived from the free advertisement given the cause.

The march from Montreal to Ottawa would be a little less than a week's tramp, and although the roads will not be too good in the spring, when the march could take place, the weather would be pleasant, and the marchers could be equipped with heavy boots and canes to help them on their way. On the road they could distribute pamphlets and give lectures.

Sykes, "We replied that with one and a half million more women than men, a few hundred can well be spared. If England is so anxious to keep her daughters let her give them better salaries."

**BOXING LAW MAY YET PASS IN WASHINGTON**  
 Montesano, Wash., March 6.—Senator Hewitt, father of the measure to establish a boxing commission in this state, has today announced his intention of attempting to have a reconsideration of the bill which several weeks ago failed of passage in both houses.

"I have many senators favoring this bill for the reason that it will do away with brutal prize-fighting and legalize boxing contests, eliminating the bad features—betting and other gambling," said Hewitt.

**LOW AND INSULTING IMPUDENCE.**  
 Nothing but insult and impudence could father the scurrilous libels hurled at the great body of the people of Canada by The Montreal Star in its crazed war-scare shrieking. Not Liberals alone, not alone the 625,000 Canadian electors who, eighteen months ago, voted for larger markets, but millions of Canadian citizens who were and still are in fullest sympathy with the Liberal policy, are, every one of them, deliberately insulted, in so far as a reckless libeller can insult anybody, by insinuations and imputations of disloyalty and treason expressed in words such as these: "They could not sell this country; and they will not be allowed to keep it disarmed in the presence of danger."

That sentence is only one out of hundreds of similar sneers at the loyalty of 48 per cent. of the electors who voted on the Canada-United States trade agreement. Such sneers are linked with panicky cries of impending disaster to Britain and the Empire if the Bor-

den naval policy is not rushed to a vote. And all this is enforced with the infamous allegation that a Canadian fleet for Canada would mean "local 'graft' for the 'rakes' and the 'rake-off boys.'"

The man who writes such words is not a moral defective, except in so far as every blatant and persistent villifier of a million people is also a fool. The newspaper that habitually and in black-faced type publishes columns of such editorial insolence is not a journalistic outlaw, except in so far as it makes itself a traitor to its country's vital interests at home and good name abroad. There might be excuse for the writer were his jingo pseudo-patriotism proved by mental experts to be a case of paresis, but for the journal there is no excuse. It takes its own place outside the pale of rational discussion. It brands itself, to the measure of its influence, as the willful traducer of Canada's honor, the shameless libeller of Canadian patriotism, the truculent disturber of Imperial unity and good-will. —Toronto Globe.
