## BASEBALL WRITERS OBJECT TO PLAYERS

**Say Alleged Criticisms by Players Deceive Public and Lower Tone of the Game**

New York, March 22—Resolutions condemning the practice of the baseball players writing for newspapers about the game were adopted yesterday at a meeting of the New York and Brooklyn chapters of the Baseball Writers' Association, held at the office of the New York National League Club.

When the resolutions were presented, Acting Chairman Jas. R. Price read letters to the New York Chapter from three members of the National Commission, August Hermann, Ban Johnson, and Thomas J. Lynch. Each offered his co-operation to the baseball writers in combatting the practice. The resolutions after noting the "practice of baseball players allowing the use of their names and signatures to articles written by other persons," declare the practice should be wiped out as tending "to deceive the baseball reading public, to lower the tone and dignity of the sport, to cause serious friction in the various teams, and to misrepresent the aims of the baseball writers."

The president of the Baseball Writers' Association of America is asked to consult with the Board of Directors with a view to adopting a similar resolution.

### REVIVED OLYMPIADS

**Late King George of Greece Was Fond of Athletics**

New York, March 22—American athletes recognized King George as the originator of the revival of the Olympic games. James E. Sullivan, American Commissioner to these sports, recalled with feeling his meeting the late ruler in 1896 and 1906, when the United States team visited Athens. Mr. Sullivan spoke of the king's democratic character and loveable disposition. To the king he gave credit for enlisting the interest of the late King Edward of England in the games.

Mr. Sullivan spoke of the King's expression of pained surprise when Martin Sheridan, the American athlete, remarked that he would throw his discus "into the creek." King George said: "Mr. Sullivan, to think that the Iliad, one of the famed streams of Greece, should be called a 'creek.'" The Iliad ran close to the Olympic stadium.

### KOOTENAY UNIONS DEMANDING INCREASE

**New Scale Drawn Up to Become Effective on April 1**

Nelson, March 22—Bricklayers here now demand \$6 per day, plasterers \$7, and hod carriers, \$4, and employers must insure painters, pipelayers and carpenters.

Demanding increased wages for several classes of labor and a Saturday half holiday for some occupations, a new scale was presented by the Nelson Trades and Labor Council and referred by the Council at a meeting last night to a committee of the whole for report. The proposed new scale is to become effective on April 1.

The present rate of wages and that demanded under the proposed new scale are: Carpenters from \$4.50 to \$5.00; painters from \$4 to \$4.50; pipelayers from \$3.50 to \$4; teamsters from \$80 to \$90 per month and eight hours instead of nine; laborers from \$3 to \$3.20 to \$3.50.

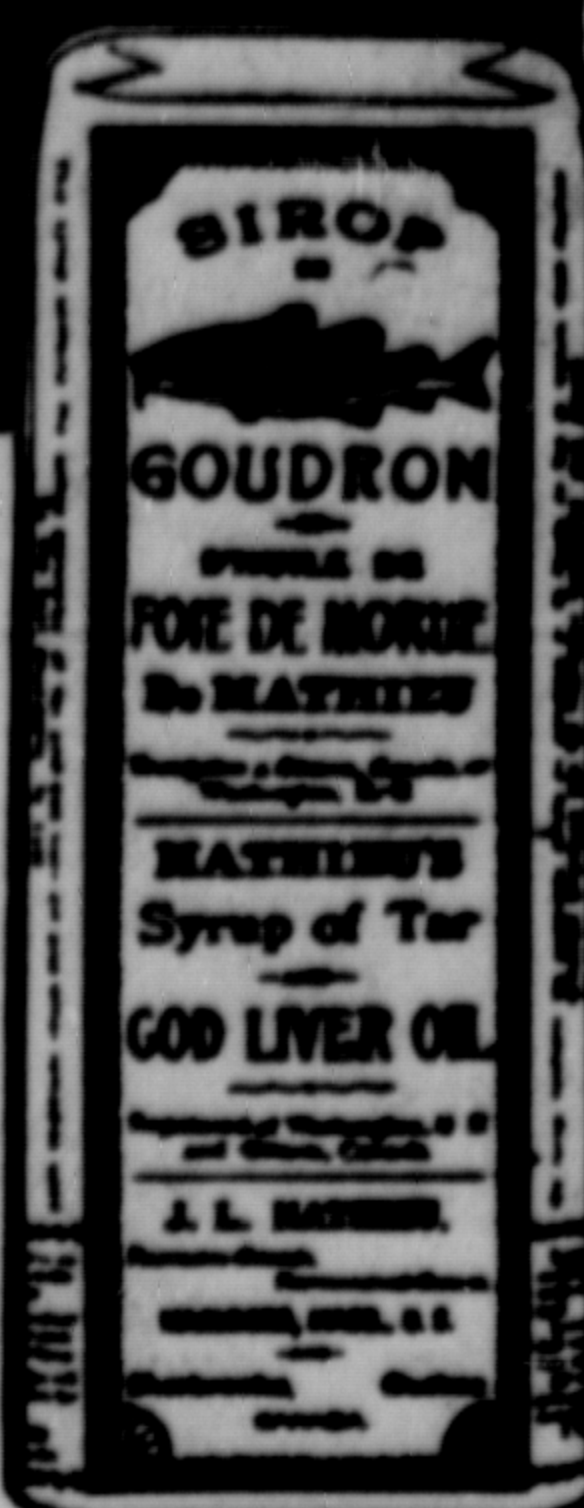
Electricians in the proposed agreement submitted asked for double pay on Sundays and holidays. A foreman under the suggested agreement is a workman in charge of one or more men and his wages are to be \$150 per month. He is not to be allowed to use tools for performing journeymen's work. The rate of pay for the workmen is scaled as follows: Linemen, inside wiremen, metermen and inspectors \$5 per day, head operator \$140 per month, station operators \$120 per month, station oilers \$100 per month.
