UNITED NATIONS (A) — U Thant of Burma will be named acting secretary-general of the United Nations today with a free hand to choose his chief assistants. The Russians backed down after trying to specify the number of principal deputies the Burmese ambassador would appoint and the areas from which they would be drawn.

The United States made a similar retreat earlier this week... The Security Council was called into a closed meeting this morning to recommend U Thant to fill out the term of Dag Hammarskjold, who was killed in a plane crash in Africa

The General Assembly was to meet this afternoon to elect U Thant. He will serve until April, 1963.

U Thant, 52, a quiet but determined diplomat, broke the U.S.-Soviet deadlock over the issue of his principal advisers by telling the big powers he would name "a limited number".
