JAPAN AND THE PANAMA EXPOSITION.

Japan has plainly intimated to the state legislature of California that if it passes the law, now under consideration, to exclude Japanese from owning real property in the state, her support will be withdrawn from the San Diego and San Francisco expositions, to be held on the opening of the Panama Canal in 1915. The attorney for the Panama-Pacific exposition warns the state that if this law is passed it will not only offend Japan, but will be displeasing to England and Germany, both of which nations desire a liberal Oriental representation before their merchants and manufacturers co-operate in the exposition, says the Vancouver Sun.

It is not difficult to see where the pressure is coming from, but it is unfortunate for California that the representative men she has chosen to manage the great fair should have such a limited view of the interests of their state as to prefer a transient gain, which, after all, will only put money into the pockets of hotel and boarding house keepers, to the permanent good of the country. California has learned, as British Columbia is learning, that Asiatics should not be permitted to occupy the land. The Panama Canal exposition will be a magnificent affair, but will

only last a few weeks. The State of California will exist as long as the world lasts and its destiny as one of the great states of America is now in the making, but if people who have special interests to serve are allowed to control the legislature, as the exposition commission evidently wishes to control it, California will, in half a century from now be no place for a white man to live.

We have the same Asiatic problem in British Columbia that our neighbors to the south have, and like them we have influences among us which prevent us from controlling and regulating Oriental immigration. The solid sense of California will probably override the opposition to the exclusion bill which is coming before the legislature, but unhappily British Columbia is not yet prepared to take an emphatic stand on this question. It is a matter of fact that aliens of every kind are given a far better opportunity by the government to take up lands than British subjects are; the province, and especially the island, is honeycombed with Chinese and Japanese settlements, and if the government continues its present policy of inaction it will not be long before we find out, as California has discovered, that white settlement in many of the most promising districts of the province will be impossible.

ASSASSIN OF KING GEORGE WAS ALONE IN THE CRIME

SCHINAS, WHO SHOT THE KING OF GREECE, REFUSES TO IMPLICATE OTHER PERSONS

Salonika, March 26.—The assassin of King George of Greece is held in close confinement. At various periods throughout the night he was forced to undergo an examination but without eliciting any further facts to show that other persons were implicated in the crime.

Schinas is not a mad man but probably weak minded. He lived by begging, and three weeks ago came to Salonika by way of Athens. He stopped for a few days at Volo, where he delivered addresses in which he stated that within a short time he would succeed in establishing equality that there would be no longer either rich or poor and that work

which was now accomplished in one hour would be spread over two. Interrogated as to why he assassinated King George, Schinas replied: "I had to die somehow, as I suffer from neurasthenia and therefore wished to redeem my life."

He appears to have led a wretched existence, subsisting almost entirely on milk. His family has long ceased to acknowledge him. Schinas for a time was an instructor in the medical department of the University of Athens. He refused to give any explanation of the crime beyond that two years ago he applied for assistance at the palace and was driven away by an aide-de-camp.

FURS TO BE MUCH DEARER NEXT YEAR

At This Year's Sale They Went Fifty Per Cent. Higher.

London, March 24.—Furs will be much dearer next year. A pre-Easter sale in London last week shows that all furs are selling at from 10 to 50 per cent. higher than they did last year.

The sale here had an unusually large attendance, the buyers numbering more than 200 and representing every country of Europe, as well as the United States. The demand for furs has increased by leaps and bounds, while the supplies have been rapidly diminishing, as was prophesied. China and Africa now remain the only places which had not developed for skins, and there is a likelihood that the next few years will see several novelties.

As usual the highest priced furs are going to Russia. One of the features of the sale here was 500 sea otters, which probably will be the last consignment for several years, as they will now be placed on the prohibited list to prevent their extermination. All brought extremely high prices.

One skin sold for the record price of \$2,300, going to Russia. This skin will be used only for making coat collars. Only about five are obtainable from the skin. The price works out at \$410 for the rough material, but a single skin, by the time it reaches the wearer, is likely to cost \$4,000.

Silver foxes were 50 per cent. higher than last year. One brought \$1,750. Blue foxes established a new record, one fetching \$145.

One feature of the sale was the increasing popularity of the American skunk. A million and a half were offered and they were eagerly taken.

The only skin which showed a decline was the lynx, which was 40 per cent. cheaper than it was a year ago, but the buyers are agreed that last year's price for lynx was unjustifiably high.

LUTHER McCARTY HAS FOUR BOUTS IN SIGHT

Big Fellow Will Take on Three Soft Ones and Then Tommy Burns.

Chicago, March 26.—Luther McCarty has practically signed up for four fights within five weeks.

The white heavyweight champion of the world will be kept busy from now on as much as it will be possible for him to be. He intends to take all of the offers made to him that are reasonably fair in a financial sense.

From present indications McCarty's bank roll will be increased by a matter of \$24,000 if all these fights go through as per schedule. He agrees to all the agreements his manager has made for him. His schedule is: April 15, six rounds in Philadelphia with Tom Flynn; May 13, six rounds in Pittsburgh with Frank Moran; May 10, ten rounds in Kansas City with Carl Morris, or some one else; May 15, about ten or more rounds in Calgary with Tommy Burns.

The first three matches are regarded by McCarty, his manager at the present time, a cinch. He is still negotiating by letter and wire with the promoters in Calgary relative to the Burns match, and last night it looked very much as if the two sides would come to blows. The Flynn and Moran matches will net McCarty \$5,000 each, the Kansas City match will bring him in \$4,000, and he will receive for his share, irrespective of the result with Burns, a guarantee of \$10,000, making the total for the four battles \$24,000.
