If the players had been well-rested Saturday I think the results would have been a little different.

Kitamaat coach Reg Smith said his team uses both a floating man-to-man defence and a box-zone defence in all of their games. They usually rely on the box-zone defence and this proves quite effective.

When all-native tournament time rolls around in the spring, Kitamaat just may be strong enough to retain the championship.
