In my three years of athletic promotion and organization in Prince Rupert, the main hue and cry of our youth (up to 30 years of age), has been toward the lack of good competitive

It grieves me then to see only half a dozen of our enthused youth-file entry forms to compete in a competition such as the recently organized nine-mile road race from Galloway Rapids Bridge to the Civic Centre.

Due to lack of entries, last Saturdays race had to be postponed until this coming Sunday. I only hope that when the starting gun goes off at 12 noon Sunday that there are more than six entries to fill the list of prizes which consist of two large perpetual trophies, and six medals.

#### Players run many miles

I often ponder on the answers received as to why won't one compete in the race. The general comment from our soccer or basketball players is that they are not in shape. These fellows never stop to consider that in a soccer game they may run anywhere from 10 to 15 miles, or in a basketball game anywhere from five to ten miles. In basketball it is generally under conditions of poor air movement and lack of circulation.

In soccer it is generally in spurts of speed up to fifty or one hundred yards. Running nine miles at slightly more than a jog is child's play in comparison.

"To compete, and not to win." That's the cue fellows, start the race at least, after that no one cares if you drop out.

Following Sunday's road race, there will be an informal dual track meet between athletes of JOTP from Terrace and Rupert. This meet will be held at Algonia Park beginning at 1,p.m. or thereabouts

Locally, we have some talent, there is also an abundance of Talent from Terrace.

What we need now is support. If you have nothing to do on Sunday, and you have been wondering about the quality of some of the north zone athletes, drop down to the grounds and give a cheer. We'd love to see you there.


