WHO IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE DEADLOCK

Authorized Statement of Opposition in Reply to Government's Statement.

If there has been a deadlock THE FAULT IS NOT ON THE PART OF THE OPPOSITION BUT ON THE PART OF THE GOVERNMENT. The opposition claim no more than the right of freedom of speech and of discussing a measure in which a principle of the highest importance is at stake.

The government have no mandate from the people to proceed with this measure, and three ministers were elected as direct opponents of naval assistance to Great Britain in any form. Notwithstanding this they have delayed all public business to force this measure unduly. The Banking Act makes no progress, no budget speech announcing a tariff policy has been made, while on only two occasions since the House opened have they asked for supply AND SUPPLY WAS AT ONCE GRANTED. Refusing thus to attend to these pressing matters of great importance to Canada, they are trying to force upon the people this measure by extreme and arbitrary methods.

In the working of parliamentary institutions it has not unfrequently happened that deadlocks have occurred between the government and the opposition. Experience has shown that there are only two methods of providing a solution; one is the use of brute force, and the other is an appeal to the people.

GLOOMY PREDICTION OF AMERICAN FUTURE

Famous French Seeress Who Foretold the Present Disastrous Floods.

Paris, March 31.—Declaration that the Omaha tornado and the death dealing floods in Ohio and Indiana are but a forerunner of the disasters to befall America in 1913 was voiced here today by Madame de Thebes, the famous Parisian seeress, who predicted at the beginning of the year the present disasters in the United States.

"Let those in America," said Mme. de Thebes, "who survive the present disaster protect themselves against further cyclones and inundations, for I cannot see any calm returning to America before April 24."

"The finger of God is at work in America. This coming September is to be the most dangerous month for that country. Terrible fire, wind and water will assail her and a large portion of her territory will slip into the sea within the next few generations. In September most of the horrors will develop from winds."

FOOTBALL GAMES IN OLD COUNTRY

Glasgow, March 31.—In the semi-finals of the Scottish cup Falkirk beat Hearts of Midlothian by one goal to nil at Ibrox Park, Glasgow. The game between Clyde and Raith Rovers at Tynecastle ended in a draw, one all.

Scottish games results: Morton 1, Dundee 1; Partick Thistle 1, Hibernians 2; Hamilton Academicals 2, Queens Park 1.

London, March 29.—The semi-finals of the English Football Association cup were played today, the games showing much interest by huge crowds. Special trains were used to carry supporters. Only one decision was reached, Aston Villa beating Oldham Athletics by the only goal scored, while the game between Sunderland and Burnley unexpectedly ended in a scoreless draw.

The funeral of the late Mrs. John Dolan, who died at the general hospital at an early hour yesterday, will take place from the Roman Catholic Church tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock. Interment will take place at Fairview cemetery.

LAURIER'S NAVY PLAN SAFER FOR ENGLAND

Canada Should Follow Example of Australia and Develop Navy of Her Own.

Laurier's instead of Borden's plan may be safer for England, says the London Daily News, for an independent Canadian fleet will be able to assist the mother country without interfering with the building of her navy in proportion to that of Germany.

The German authorities, precisely because they announce their fleet as intended for defence, could not count the local navies of the dominions under local control as additions to the British navy or in any way increasing the potential danger to German security. German naval apprehensions must be wholly European, and the dominion navies are wholly extra-European. It follows, therefore, that Canada would be doing the best for herself and for this country and for the peace of the world if, instead of presenting three battlefleets to the British navy, she followed the example of Australia and developed a local navy of her own.

KID OLMEN HEARD FROM

Wishes to Box Billy Weeks or Mortimer with Ben Self to Referee.

"Kid" Olmen has been heard from. He writes from Courtney, B. C., that since his fight here with Mortimer last November he has been east and done some boxing. He had one which went thirty-six rounds in Omaha and two goes in Oskas, Wis., all of which he pulled off successfully. He hopes to land a fight at Courtney, but also hopes to get one at Prince Rupert. He would take on Billy Weeks or Mortimer at 153 lbs. with a \$500 side bet and Ben Self to referee. He asks to be remembered to Billy Wright, Ole Anderson and Hank.

Calgary Hotel License Suspended.

Calgary, March 31.—The liquor license of the King George Hotel, Calgary's largest house, was today suspended by provincial government license inspectors. Violating closing hours is assigned action. The hotel is said to have cleared \$75,000 last year.
