Prince Rupert's entry in the forthcoming Ketchikan International Basketball Tournament stands as good a chance as any other team of winning.

The local team, sponsored by Savoy, is made up of the entire Savoy team and Vikings' Art Helin.

Eight teams have entered the tourney which will be held from January 17 to January 20. Along with Savoy, there are teams from Juneau, Wrangell, Shelton Jackson Junior College at Sitka, New Metlakatla, two from Ketchikan and a team

from the United States Air Force base at Prince George. Savoy has already played the Rockets from Ketchikan twice, winning both, But the Rockets didn't have their complete team and possibly this will make a difference in the tourney.

The Ketchikan High School Kings are a fairly strong team, but, all things being equal, shouldn't provide too much opposition against the senior teams.

Sitka's entry is in about the same position as Kings. Reports on the other teams are not available but there may be some top individual players playing ball in the tourney. Prince George's entry could be the surprise of the tournament. Little is known about them and it's possible they have some excel-

lent players on their lineup.

Savoy has little height

Savoy is hampered somewhat because of lack of height. But speed, accuracy and sharp defence may make up for this

handicap. Terry Shenton, Jack Mitchell and Helin all stand six-feet, two inches, and they are the team's tallest players. Tuffy Howe is six-foot-one but the remaining players, Ray Spring, Ron Ciccone, Gus Nickerson, Billy Smith and Blair Andrews, are all six feet or under.

Rockets have six-foot, seven-inch Bud Keyes on their roster and several other tall players. Most of the other teams are reported to have several tall players.

Savoy coach Alex Bill said he doesn't know what to expect in the tournament. He said the other teams will probably beat Savoy on rebounds but "if we catch on like we did before Christmas, we'll do well. I don't say we'll win, but we'll do

After last Thursday's ball game which Savoy narrowly won, dressing-room talk centred around whether or not other players should be picked up for the tourney. There was some talk of picking up Vikings' John Newton

and Gary Morison because of their height Should put up good fight

But coach Bill said he didn't want to carry too many players. "We'd have some of them sitting on the bench for the entire game", he stated.

After a little more discussion, it was agreed that "we'll go with what we have plus Helin".

Even if they don't win, the Savoy team should put up a good fight in every game. Their work is cut out for them. It'll be a tough haul but they have the horses to do it. Good luck boys and please don't get knocked out at least until




