REGINA (CP)—About 4 p.m. on June 30, 1912, the barometer began dropping in Regina. Thunderheads gathered in the southwest and southeast until they covered the sky. Lightning flashed between the approaching black clouds. At 4:50 the clouds met with a roar and a pillar of swirling, writhing blackness hit the city at Lorne and Smith streets, four blocks from the centre of the downtown


