VANCOUVER (CP) -- A 16year-old girl who fed lye to her baby son was sentenced in Assize Court Friday to five years in Ontario's Kingston Penitentiary.

Ruth Curtis of Vancouver pleaded guilty to administering lye with intent to endanger the life of the child.

The prosecution entered a stay of proceedings on an attempted murder charge against the girl.

In passing sentence, Mr. Justice Harry Sullivan said he would recommend the girl receive psychotherapy and that it was desirable that she be kept away from her son, now 216 years old.

"This is a very distressing case," he said after learning that the boy may be injured for life.






