



The jury, under Coroner George E. Dawes, was inquiring into the death of Jeffrey William Jakumeit, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Rainer Jakumeit of 247 Fifth Avenue West.

The child, who would have been three March 10, died at 7:20 p.m. in Prince Rupert General Hospital, about 31/2 hours after being in collision with a car driven by 18-year-old Norman A. Munro of 1600 Moresby Avenue in the 200 block Sixth 'Avenue West.
