LONDON--- A new glass able to vithstand temperature extremes and possible impact by birds in Mow-altitude flying has been deweloped by two British firms for windshields of aircraft travelling at Mach 2—twice the speed of sound.

Because it contains more aluminum oxide than normal aircraft glass, the new material can sustain temperatures from minus-80 degrees to 200 degrees Centigrade without loss of | strength.

The development was announced recently in London by Barrie Heath, managing director of the Triplex Safety Glass Co. Ltd., which worked in conjunction with Pilkington Brothers. the St. Helens glass manufacturers, to produce the new pro-

It heats the glass, say Triplex experts, to a constant temperature of around 30, degrees Centigrade. In addition to demisting and de-icing, this keeps the windshield's plastic interlayer ab its maximum strength to withstand bird impact or bullets.

The gold-film glass has been supplied to virtually all British aircraft at present in development, plus the Vanguard and f Comet IV—as well as diesel locomolive windshields for British railways.


