BIGGEST BLASTS YET WILL SOON BE FIRED

Over Sixty Tons of Powder Will Be Used in One of Them. Archie McDougall is making the final preparations for two of the biggest blasts ever put off in Prince Rupert. Both are in connection with the Hays Cove excavation. In the smaller of the two, which will probably be fired this week, between 45 and 50 tons of powder will be consumed. It is calculated that this shot will move and crumble 100,000 yards of rock. The other and larger shot will not be fired until next week. About 33 1-3 per cent. more powder will be used.

COUNT CARBONNEAU JAILED

In Connection With Promotion of a Railway in Ecuador. Charles Eugene Carbonneau, formerly of Montreal but well-known in the north during the earlier days of the Yukon, was arrested on Saturday at Boulange-sur-Mer while on his way from London to Paris. Carbonneau, who was originally a waiter in a restaurant in Montreal, went to the Klondike in 1899 and was known there as a "count." His arrest in France, according to the cable despatches, is in connection with the promotion of a railway in Ecuador.

NAKUSP IS HANDED A ROTTEN RAW DEAL

Government Gives Citizens Few Feet of Waterfront and Railway a Mile. Nakusp, April 14.—Nakusp will shortly send an influential deputation to Victoria to protest against what its people consider the rawest kind of a raw deal handed out to them by the Provincial government by the alienation of the foreshore rights in that town to the detriment of the people and the future progress of the town. About a year ago the Canadian Pacific Railway Company made application to the Provincial government for the whole of the waterfront at Nakusp for trackage purposes. Immediately this was made known, a storm of protest arose. Public meetings were held and resolutions opposing the "grab" were passed by the board of trade, the farmers' institute, and even the local Conservative association. As a result of these protests, letters were received from members of the government, including Hon. Price Ellison, in which the promise was made that "the interests of Nakusp would be safeguarded." The value of this promise is shown by the result. The Canadian Pacific gets a mile of waterfront, whilst the town is given only sixty-six feet. Naturally the residents are indignant.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Vancouver Island, west coast, Barclay Sound, eastern channel, channel rocks—Gas and whistling buoy to be established about May 1st on east side of Channel rocks. White light, automatically occulted at short intervals. Chart of Arthur and Telegraph Passages issued—A chart, in colors, of Arthur and Telegraph Passages, British Columbia, numbered 304 of the Canadian Hydrographic Survey, has just been published by the Hydrographic Survey, Department of the Naval Service of Canada. Chatham Sound, Holland Island—Fog alarm established at the lighthouse on Holland Island. Description: Diaphone, operated with air, compressed by an oil engine. It will give one blast of 3 seconds' duration every 20 seconds, thus: Blast, 3 seconds; silent interval, 17 seconds. Queen Charlotte Islands, Hecate Strait, Skidegate Inlet, eastward of Deadtree Point—Amended characteristic of gas buoy light, Off Lawn Point—Spar buoy to be established, 1.55 miles 130 degrees (S. 77 degrees E. Mag.) from Deadtree Point. The light shown from this gas buoy will be fixed white instead of occulting as formerly advertised. On or about May 1st, 1913, Lawn Point gas and bell buoy will, without further notice, be moved to a new position 5,800 feet north (N. 27 degrees W. Mag.) from its present position and 0.9 mile 143 degrees (N. 86 degrees E. Mag.) from Lawn Point. As soon as Lawn Point gas and bell buoy is moved, a black spar buoy will be established at its old position, 1.54 miles 147 degrees (S. 60 degrees E. Mag.) from Lawn point. Sailing Directions—Vessels entering Skidegate should bring Lawn Point gas buoy (in its new position) to bear 258 degrees (S. 51 degrees W. Mag.) and make directly for it turning sharp southward just before reaching it. Thence a course 182 degrees (S. 25 degrees E. Mag.) with Lawn Point buoy directly astern and Deadtree buoy directly ahead will lead to the latter clear of all dangers. Care must be taken to leave the spar buoy on the port hand. Passing Deadtree buoy on the port hand the course is 208 degrees (S. 4 degrees W. Mag.) until Tree Island is passed. Strait of Georgia, Haro Strait, Patos Island light station, Alden Point—Fog signal to be temporarily discontinued. The fog signal will be temporarily discontinued from June 1st to July 1st, 1913, pending the installation of a new fog signal plant.

LOCAL NEWS ITEMS.

Henry Doyle and family left last night on the ss. Venture for Milbay Cannery. It's the fire under the kettle that keeps it boiling—it's the advertising and enthusiasm at the back of the business that keeps it going. The Borealis arrived in port last night, after being out only two or three days, with about five tons of halibut for the Alton Fisheries, Ltd. The ss. Venture of the Union Steamship Company did not arrive from the south until 4.30 yesterday afternoon. She left again at 7 o'clock last night for Granby and Naas River points. Owing to the large amount of freight the Chelons did not take the run this week as was expected. She is scheduled to leave here for the south at ten o'clock tonight. Marketing Municipal Bonds. At the time of the disposal of Toronto's and Vancouver's bonds to well known United States bond brokers the Monetary Times remarked that several other like purchases were pending. Since then enquiries emanating from United States have been frequently received asking for information regarding Canadian bonds, status of municipalities, methods of debenture issuance, etc., all of which seems to show there is a market available for bonds of Canadian municipalities. Two issues recently disposed of in the United States were those of Prince Rupert, B. C., and W. land. Prince Rupert's issue amounted to \$80,491, and Messrs. Terry, Briggs & Slayton, Toledo, Ohio, were the purchasers—Monetary Times. THE WEATHER.
