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

OTTAWA (P)— Unemployment u Canada rose to 583,000 at mid-February, 136,000 lower than the post-war jobless peak a year earlier, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The February jobless total, 38,000 higher than in January, of represented 9.1 per cent of the labor force, compared with 8.3 The bureau said the charges
