

BERLIN () --- Robert F. Kennedy placed a wreath "to the victims of Communist tyranny" at the wall dividing Berlin today and received some cautious waves from East Berliners beyond the barrieade.

ANKARA (4) --- A mutiny by disgruntled young army officers that brought Turkey to the brink of civil war was declared smushed today. The armed forces chiefs stood firmly by Premier Ismot Inonu.

LONDON (A) --- The United Kingdom Atomic Energy Authority said today Britain will explode a nuclear device underground in Novada "during the next week or two." The device is understood to be a component of a nuclear warhead. The explosion will be in the low kiloton range.

LEOPOLDVILLE (A) -- The United Nations accused President Moise Tshombe today of preparing for a new military showdown in The Congo. It expressed doubt that the Kalanga president's good faith in seeking a peaceful settlement with the rest of The Congo.
