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

ALGIERS (6) -- European secret army guerrillas were shooting down innocent Mostems at random today. At least 10 Moslems were killed within a few hours as the right-wing extremists pressed their cold-blooded terrorist drive to sabotage Algerian peace plans.

KAMPALA, Uganda (Reuters) - Strict security measures were clamped on northern Uganda today following an outbreak of weekend violence that shook this British protectorate, scheduled to receive internal self-rule in three days.

Strong police detachments were patrolling the northern countles of Buyaga and Bugangazi, where crowds of Negroes were dispersed with gunfire and tear gas.

COLOMBO, Ceylon (Renters) --- Governor-General Sir Oliver Goonetilleke, who may be questioned in connection with an unsuccessful coup here, has resigned his office, it was announced today.

He is to be succeeded March 2 by William Clopallawa, Coylon's ambassador in Washington.

NEW DELJII (Routers) --- Defence Minister V. K. Krishna Menon forged into an early lead today in a bitterly-contested parliamentary race that put Prime Minister Nehru's prestige at
