

## MOST OF THE CREW WERE HURLED INTO THE WATER AND BADLY BURNED-BOAT BURNED TO THE WATER'S EDGE.

CREW HAVE NARROW ESCAPE

As the result of an explosion burns dressed on their arrival of gasoline yesterday the G. R. here. About the only one who Hughes, a fishing boat owned and escaped without any injury was operated by the Deep Sea Fishing Captain Batt.

Supply Co. of Vancouver, was burned to the water's edge and the majority of a crew of twelve had hairbreadth escapes from being blown to pieces or drowned. The accident occurred about 11 o'clock in the morning while the boat was lying at anchor some three hundred yards from the shore of Stephens Island and about thirty miles from Prince Rupert. The boat had made an early start for the fishing banks but on account of trouble with her exhaust had to come to anchor for repairs. When the accident happened most of the men were around the bow of the boat on deck and as the explosion was in the forward tank most of them! were thrown into the water. The bow of the staunch boat was completely blown to pieces. Captain James Batt, who happened to be near the stern, with the assistance of another man immediately launched a dory. Several men 2 were swimming and calling for Fortunately all were picked up by the dory and made their way to shore.
