## 25 persons sentenced to death

BEIRUT (A)—A Lebanese military court today imposed 25 death sentences in the mass trial of army officers and politicians for attempting to over- Wilson said a "high police ofthrow the government last new ficial" recommended that the year's eve.

Charges were brought against 287 of the leaders of the attempted coup that never got off the ground and more death sentences are expected. The prose-cution has demanded that 177 be executed.

Some of the accused still are at large. They were tried in ab-Col. Jamil Husami pronounc-

None of the defendants appeared in the dock as the first sentences were handed down, ranging from 10 years imprisonment to death.
