Canada's Parliament runs full course

OTTAWA (P) --- From international trade to small debtors, the Berlin situation, travelling salesmen, and on to the problems of small farmers. Parliament ran the full course Tuesday.

The night sitting ended on an agricultural note with Liberal Hazen Argue offering criticisms of the government's attitude on sederal farm loans. This, he said, is what small farmers are told when seeking a loan: "Unless you get to be a bigger farmer, so you can

take a bigger loan, we won't give you anything at all." The MP for Assinibola accused the government of "arbtrary action" that has denied the benfits of leans legislation to small farmers.
