

POLICE WILL CRACK DOWN ON UNNECESSARY NOISE IN 1963

Tonight may be the last chance you'll have to blow

New Year's celebrants will probably be the last to get away with horn blowing and other noise of an unnecessary kind.

Starting in the new year, the city will enforce its anti-noise regulations, according to word today from city hall. Police will crack down on unnecessary car noise. The measure is particularly aimed at horn blaring of wedding parties.

In curbing noise generally, common sense will be exercised, officials said. By this they meant that use of power saws would probably be tolerated, but not unnecessary noise.
