Missionaries visit city

Rev. and Mrs. Walter B. McNealy and their 16-year old daughter, Mary Jean, were visitors in the city over the weekend, on their way from New Orleans, Louisiana to Ketchikan,

Pastor McNealy, who was born in Kentucky, has been a misionary for the Southern Baptist Church in South America for the past 25 years. He has been stationed at Volta-Redonda, Brazil, a city of 70,000 people, of whom 13,000 work at the huge steel mill there.

He went out to replace Solomon Ginsburg, writer of the book "The Wandering Jew," who died while he was on furlough and preparing to go back to the jungles of Brazil to continue his

At this town, which is the steel centre of Brazil, Pastor Mc-Nealy has founded a school, the American Baptist College, of which he is president.
