



HMCS ORIOLE, the Royal Canadian Navy's sailing training ship is scheduled to arrive in Prince Rupert about 10 a.m. tomorrow. The 100-foot vessel is expected to be accompanied by two Naval harbor craft and YMT 10, a Naval diving tender. It will be the first visit to Prince Rupert for the Oriole which is on a university naval training cruise of cadet officers from all universities across Canada. Her last port of call was Victoria and she will be in Prince Rupert until Sunday when she will leave for Ketchikan Juneau and Skagway. The ship, under Lt. Comm. C. A. Prosser, CD, RCN, commanding officer of the squadron, has a complement of 30 cadets - RCN Photo and four officers. She has two 90-foot high masts.
