PRE-EMPTORS WHO DECEIVE GOVT. REGARDING TIMBER

(Continued from Page 1.)

and straightway returned to town to enjoy himself on the results of his little speculation, displaying no further interest in his property as a future farm.

The facts coming to the notice of the Department, investigation was at once ordered. A cruise showed the timber to run from fifteen to thirty-five thousand feet to the acre, so the pre-emption was cancelled and the timber already cut seized. Seven hundred thousand feet had already been cut and removed. The remainder on the holding was estimated at 1,050,000 feet, but actually scaled 920,000 feet, and this has now been sold to Messrs. Summer & Dahl at \$1.50 per thousand in addition to the royalty, the purchasing firm assuming also all charges and expenses incidental to the seizure.

In addition there was also sold to the same firm all standing timber on the extinguished pre-emption, this comprising approximately 780,000 feet, almost wholly fir, at \$1.00 per thousand and royalty, the sale being made conditional upon the whole being logged off within two years. Forty acres of this tract when cleared by the loggers will constitute a suitable site for a small farm, the soil being dark clay, bottom land. The other portions of the tract are stony and precipitous.

JUDGMENT RESERVED IN GAMBLING CHARGE

Several Witnesses Testified That Rake-Off Was Taken in Game at the Grand Hotel.

Magistrate Cars reserved decision this morning in the case of George Broderius, proprietor of the Grand Hotel, charged with keeping a gambling house. The information was laid by John Mooney, who gave evidence to the effect that with several other men he had engaged in a game of poker in the Grand Hotel in which Broderius also took a hand. Mooney also swore that a rake-off had been taken. Following the game there had been a row between Broderius and Mooney in regard to some work on a sewer and it was a result of this row that the information had been laid. Several other witnesses testified as to a game being played and a rake-off taken. Broderius, in the box, denied that a rake-off had been taken but admitted that Mooney had given him fifteen dollars after the game. This Broderius claimed Mooney owed him but he did not deny giving the latter two dollars before the game started. Decision in the case will be given tomorrow morning.

MAYOR PATTULLO TO SELL DEBENTURES

(Continued from Page 1.)

this when he assumed office and was willing to undertake it.

He wished to thank the council for the way in which it had co-operated during the year in the expedition of business so as to have the business so far advanced to now allow of an attempt being made to raise the necessary money. With this he desired to join the staff of the city, who had shown a disposition to work only for the interests of the city. There had been an evident desire at all times on the part of the staff to forget their own feelings in the matter and to do all they could in the city's interest.

He should start on his mission with the assurance of President Chamberlin, of the Grand Trunk Pacific, that the company would do everything possible to assist him in raising the money. This assistance he very much appreciated, as it gave him hopes of ultimate success.

Alderman Bullock - Webster said that while he desired to see everything done that might be done to raise the money, and while he did not wish to obstruct anything, yet it seemed to him there was nothing definite in the motion as to the amount of expenditure to raise this money and on other points. It was intimated that if by any circumstance it was not possible to raise the money in Montreal or New York they might find it necessary to go to Europe. That seemed to him an unnecessary length to go to and would certainly be an unnecessary expense to the city. If the securities they had to offer could not be placed in Montreal or New York he could not see the wisdom of proceeding to Europe, going to further expense and meeting with the same money stringency abroad. He did not care on short notice to introduce an amendment but he desired to be informed whether the motion had been on the notice board the prescribed number of hours.

The mayor did not think it had but the motion could come in as the report of the finance committee in any event. He had himself raised the point at the last meeting of the council and had given warning that it was coming up. He had no desire to rush anything though and if the council desired a longer time to consider the motion he would be agreeable to lay it over until another meeting, to be held the following evening. He and the city solicitor would go to Montreal and what they should do after that would be guided by circumstances. If it was necessary to go to Europe the motion would enable them to do so. But they did not purpose going to Europe unless it was absolutely necessary. He felt, however, that the city would not get money by sitting down and waiting for it. He realized as well as any man on the council the conditions they were up against, and he asked the council to allow this motion to go through the way it was.

Alderman Bullock - Webster then moved an amendment that the mayor and city solicitor be authorized to proceed to the eastern cities and that the city bear the expenses. He saw no need of going to the capitals of Europe if they found the state of the money market in the east against them.

Alderman Maitland did not see anything to be gained by the amendment. He had confidence in the mayor and if he found it

necessary to go to Europe let him do so. He should be empowered to do so at any rate as the city needed all the money it could possibly get.

The mayor said they might leave the Europe part to his discretion and if the council did not care to do that he would rather stay at home. They were going to put up a great fight to get this money in the east and it might not be necessary to go to Europe. He hoped it would not be. But if they were unable to effect anything in the east he should wire to the council asking for further instruction.

Alderman Dybhavn said the task the mayor had undertaken was an arduous one and he hoped to see him succeed.

Alderman Kerr supported the motion as he saw there was a fighting chance in the mayor's trip.

The motion was then carried, Alderman Bullock - Webster's amendment not having found a seconder, and the following was moved by Alderman Sutherland, seconded by Alderman McCaffery:

That in addition to the powers given to his worship the mayor by the accompanying resolution, his worship is hereby authorized to make such arrangements as in his discretion he may think fit for the purpose of procuring temporary advances to carry on the local improvement works authorized by Construction Bylaw No. 187, such arrangements to be made with any bank, corporation or person.

The mayor explained that the money had not been raised to carry on the Market place work, that on Sixth street and other places, and this motion was intended to give him the authority to raise the money for these works.

Alderman Bullock - Webster said if the mayor would tell them why there should be such a hurry about it they would be in a position to assist him. For himself he did not believe in this one man government.

The mayor replied that it was necessary to give someone power to act, as other cities had done in similar cases, otherwise the money could not be obtained. Personally he would be several thousand dollars ahead if he did not go, and if he did not go with the full confidence of the council he did not desire to go.

The motion then carried and the mayor again referred to the assurances of assistance he had received from the president of the Grand Trunk Pacific and the manager of the Bank of Montreal and that after consultation with those two gentlemen he would be able to advise the council further as to his course in the matter.

The council then adjourned. The amount called for by these bylaws is approximately two and a half millions. It foots up to a higher total, but this is because certain outstanding certificates are included, but these certificates are to be liquidated from the results of the sale of the debentures.

Mayor Pattullo and City Solicitor Peters leave on their mission by the Prince Rupert on Monday. The mayor will be accompanied by Mrs. Pattullo and daughter. The mayor says that after a short stay in Vancouver they will proceed to Chicago and thence to Montreal. After that their doings rest on the lap of the gods. Alderman McCaffery is acting mayor until the return of Alderman Naden.

The funeral of the late William Humphrey, whose body was found floating in the harbor on Tuesday morning, will take place at 3 o'clock this afternoon from Hayner Bros.' parlors. Rev. F. W. Kerr will conduct the service, after which interment will take place at Fairview cemetery. Deceased's brother from Alford Bay is in the city to attend the obsequies.
