DROP THE RAINBOW FROM WAR FLEET

She May Replace Shearwater for Survey Work on the Pacific Coast.

Victoria, May 5.—It is the opinion here among those who are in touch with the Canadian navy that the Rainbow's connection with the Canadian navy is about at an end. It is stated on good authority that preparations are being made to place the vessel in dry dock, all ammunition and other equipment having already been removed. It is well known that between thirty and forty men of the crew, most of them petty officers, will return to the British admiralty in June and no attempt has been made to replace them, it being impossible to obtain recruits. It is said that Admiral Kingsmill while here recently intimated that if the present navy bill before the house of commons passes the Rainbow will either be sent back to the old country or turned over to the British admiralty for service on the Pacific, probably replacing the Shearwater. It was expected that the Rainbow would go to Vancouver to meet and bring over Admiral Kingsmill, but at the last moment it was decided inadvisable to do so, owing to the lack of sufficient crew to handle the vessel properly. At all events it is believed that the Rainbow's days are numbered as a Canadian vessel.

Seattle, May 6.—A 50 per cent. reduction in Alaska cable tolls on commercial messages not exceeding ten words was yesterday announced by the government, to take effect on July 1.
