NARROW ESCAPE OF FIVE MEN ON A RAFT

Were Imprisoned by an Ice Flow on Fraser River and Nearly Starved to Death.

Fort George, May 13.—Five men, starving for want of food and almost frozen to death, were imprisoned in an ice flow which broke away and carried them down the Fraser until it lodged against a rock in midstream. There the starving men were hung up without means of escape until yesterday, when they were discovered and rescued. They were brought here and cared for and will probably recover.

They had been engaged in construction work at Tete Jaune Cache and were coming down the river on a raft when engulfed in the ice flow.

WAS FINED FOR USING OBSCENE LANGUAGE

Jack Frost Will Soon Learn to Keep Cool—Fined \$10.00 and Costs

Jack Frost, the man who wanted to be "tried by a judge," was this morning ordered by Magistrate Carss to pay a fine of \$10 and \$2 costs for using obscene language on the streets. The evidence of the constable who made the arrest on Sunday evening was corroborated by that of another constable and by one of the fire ladders. It is not to be inferred that Jack was so hot that the fire department was required to cool him off.

COOK STILL IN JAIL

One Suretor Appears for Former Head of Bankers' Trust Co.

Victoria, May 10.—Franklin C. Cook, one of the accused in the Bankers' Trust case, having been unable to arrange for \$5,000 bail in addition to the \$8,000 already put up on a previous charge, is in custody. The two others associated with him, namely, Messrs. J. O. Hearn and R. N. O'Connor, are at liberty on the \$8,000 bail each fixed by County Court Judge Lampman on Wednesday.

It is expected that Mr. Cook will be able to secure the two securities of \$2,500 required today, one of his friends having left for Vancouver to make the arrangements. Today one suretor for Mr. Cook appeared and it is probable that his bail will be satisfactorily arranged before the day is out.

PRaises WORK OF MISSIONARY

John W. Parr, one of the recent pre-emptors taking up land in the Naas valley, is in town this week. Like others who have gone into that district, he is very optimistic as to its future. He speaks in the highest terms of the work that has been done by Rev. J. B. McCullagh, who has been doing missionary work there for many years. Through the assistance of the reverend gentleman the Indian settlers have built comfortable homes for themselves that would be a credit to any community. Mr. Parr is delighted with the character of the soil and the climate.

HEADS GOVERNMENT ROADS

Order-in-Council Appointing Mr. Gutelius General Manager Tabled in Commons.

Ottawa, May 8.—The order-in-council appointing Mrs. F. P. Gutelius general manager of government railways was tabled in the commons today by Hon. Frank Cochrane. It provides for the abolition of the political board of management and defines the duties of the new general manager as being to supervise and direct all departments of said government railways.

Mr. Gutelius is appointed for a two year term at an annual salary of \$20,000. Under the terms of his appointment he will also be in charge of the Hudson's Bay Railway when it is completed.

NEW HAZELTON NOTES.

Repairing the Roads.

Thomas Brewer started out Monday morning with a gang of 25 men to repair the government road between the old town and Mud Creek hill. The first couple of days were spent between the old town and the Bulkley hill, and since then they have been working on the New Hazelton side of the river. Considerable work is to be done on the government road in the new town, and the men will be stationed here for several days.

Auto Stage to Aldermere.

McAfee's automobile will be put on the New Hazelton-Aldermere-Telkwa run within the next few days. The auto will make three return trips a week connecting with trains from Prince Rupert at this point and returning from the valley will get the passengers here in time for the morning trains. Mr. McAfee states that he will give a first class service and that the schedule will be kept to the letter.

Married Men Defeated.

There was a lot of excitement on the ball grounds on Sunday afternoon, when the married men played the singles. A big crowd gathered to witness the sport. The game was all in favor of the married men until the fatal sixth, when Pitcher Lynch's arm went bad and he passed the bat- ters as fast as they stepped to the plate. He exchanged places with Sinclair behind the bat and from that on they managed to hold their own, but the single men had got a lead and were in much better shape all around to stand the pace. The final score was 13-8 in favor of the young fellows.

Auto Stage to Old Town.

Gordon Wilson has been in the old town several days this week getting his automobile in shape for the run between here and the old town. The machine is being thoroughly overhauled and it will be the reliable stage line between the two towns again this year.

Another Ore Shipment.

Duke Harris received instructions from E. L. Kinman, owner of the Erie mine, to make another carload shipment of the ore at once. Duke came down from the Harris mines on Tuesday and had the miners on the Erie tunnel contract start work mining. There are about twenty tons sacked and about ten more tons to be mined. The ore should all be ready for shipment early next week.—Omineca Herald.

Quite an Acquisition.

John Hetherington left on the Thursday train for Prince Rupert, where he will be connected with the Union Bank of Canada. John has been in Old Hazelton since the bank opened there, and he was one of the most popular young men in that town. He took a leading part in all the athletic movements and his place will be very hard to fill. At the same time Prince Rupert gains the best short distance runner that ever drew breath in their burg. John will also be quite an acquisition to the Union Bank staff there.—Omineca Herald.

Founder of Japanese Navy.

The founder of the Japanese navy was an Englishman named Will Adams, who went to the eastern seas as pilot of a Dutch fleet in 1598 and was cast away in Japan a couple of years later. He became a Japanese noble and constructor of the navy to the tycoon, but was never allowed to return to England. He died about twenty years afterward, very ingeniously leaving half his property to his wife and family in England and half his property to his wife and family in Japan. After his death he was deified.—Exchange.

More Pay for Chairman.

Ottawa, May 8.—Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways, has given notice of an amendment to the Railway Act, providing that the salary of the chairman shall be \$12,500 per annum. This is an increase of \$2,500, as Chairman Drayton and the previous chairman of the board were paid \$10,000 a year.

Southern Representation.

Chicago, May 13.—The Progressive Republican leaders in the party convention have decided to urge the national committee as a radical reform party to cut down the southern representation.
