Their visit to the country began some 21/2 months ago in Saskatoon, where they attended sessions at the Western Co-operative College.

After leaving Prince Rupert this Friday, they will complete their studies in Antigonish, Nova Scotia.

In an interview Friday night, each of the visitors agreed that Canadian co-operative associations were far advanced from those in their own countries.

They said co-operatives were still under the protective wing of government in their nations. Mr. Bucksimiar said he had found it surprising to find little government control in Canadian

co-ops. Mr. Bucksimiar, inspector of Co-op Societies for his government, said co-op organizations in his country were on a much smaller scale than in Canada.

All three men agreed that fishermen, and other co-op members in their respective countries, were also poorly educated in their trades as compared to the Canadians. STUDY OUR CO-OPS

"That is one reason we are here," said Mr. Rashid, who is a co-operative officer with the government of Malaya. "We want to study Canadian co-operatives, and Canadian methods, so we may carry more knowledge to our operations.

"In Malaya, after independence, we realized the only way to develop the country quickly was through a co-operative program."

Mr. Bucksimiar said he had an especial interest in the fishing industry and in fishermen's co-operative associations. He sald Ceylonese fishermen were faced with competition from the world-wide Japanese fishing fleet.

"They come and take fish from around our island, can it, and sell it back to us," he said. "We should be doing this




