#### TWO BOATS TO BE CHARTERED FOR HALIBUT TAGGING JOB

Wednesday, March 6, 1963

The International Pacific Halibut Commission plans to charter two vessels for about 120 days each starting about the middle of April, at Seattle or Vancouver, for halibut investigations.

One vessel required to be equipped to fish with both setline and trawl gear, will be used to tag and conduct other investigations on halibut, chiefly on flats in southeastern Bering Sea.

The other vessel, which should be equipped to fish halibut with setline gear, will be employed near Kodiak

Tenders will be accepted until noon March 20.


