LONDON (Reuters) — Britain's pound sterling under pressure in the wake of the nation's failure to win Common Market membership — dipped below its official value on the London foreign exchange market

It was the first such drop since the Cuban crisis last year.

But sterling recovered after being quoted at \$2.7997 to \$2.7999 U.S. to the pound this morning. The official rate is \$2.80 though the pound is allowed to vary from \$2.78 to \$2.82.

The pound weakened on all major exchanges. It dropped slightly below par against the West German mark and appeared in need of a little official support, experts said.
