# NOW PREACHING REPENTANCE

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - Billie Sol Estes, introduced as "that famous former financier of the world", told a sparsely attended gathering here that repentance is essential to religious salvation.

The now-bankrupt rancher from Pecos, Tex., convicted in November of a fertilizer storage and mortgage swindle, passed the collection basket at the end of his sermon at the Church of Christ here Wednesday night.

He told the gathering of about 80 Negro worshippers, "if man had followed Christ's simple plan, there would be no trouble today."

Estes is free, pending an appeal of his conviction for swindling a farmer. He was accused last year in a widespread fertilizer scandal that touched off investigations in the U.S. department of agriculture.
