

## Pope calls for ban on nuclear weapons



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
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## OFFICIAL COUNT FOR SKEENA WILL TAKE PLACE APRIL 29 Political leaders trying

VANCOUVER (0) --- The four major parties estimated Tuesday that they spent a total of approximately \$134,000 as each put up a full slate of 22 candidates for British Columbia's federal seats.

NDP party officials estimated \$33,000 was spent in the province -- approximately \$1,-500 a riding. Social Credit officials estimated expenditure at \$13,200, or \$600 a constituency. Liberal and Progressive Con-

LONDON (Reuters) — Prime Minister Macmillan's government faced strong criticism today following publication of the former Anglo-American agreement on the supply of Polaris missiles to Britain. The agreement is the most controversial defence proposal here in years. There is no clear picture of size or cost.
