CHET NEFF KNOCKED OUT MEXICAN CHAP

Finals Came Suddenly in Third Round—Kegg and Williams Gave Good Preliminary.

The fifteen round fight between Billy Willard, champion featherweight of Mexico and Arizona, and Chet Neff, the lightweight champion of the Pacific Coast, which took place in McIntyre Hall on Saturday night, resulted in the latter retaining his title, Willard going to the mat in the third round and taking the count.

Harry Austin was the referee and Billy Wright acted as the official timekeeper. Both men appeared in splendid condition, Neff a trifle finely trained and looking frail in contrast to his shorter and sturdier opponent. There was also a great contrast in the ring methods of the two. Willard showed some pretty footwork in the first round but was not as quick as Neff, and he adopted the crouching, all-cover style, while his lithe opponent stood straight and open, like the English fighters of the days long past.

In the first round Willard met the blows of Neff by his crossed arms, swung a body blow and then clinched. He got in two or three good blows to the body, but when he tried for the head was cleverly countered.

The second round opened with a rapid interchange of blows and toward the middle of the round Willard began to crouch still more and was apparently afraid of the straight hitting of Neff, who seemed to fight entirely for the head, very rarely landing on the body. But this was Neff's round beyond a doubt.

The third opened with a rush by Neff and some in-fighting in which Willard was evidently rattled. Soon Neff was chasing the Mexican all over the ring, hitting him at will, but Willard kept well covered. At last with a heavy left to the body Neff got his long sought for opening and smashed a heavy right swing to the jaw. Willard went down like an ox and took the count.

Neff was the favorite in the betting. He left today for Seattle, where he has a match on for the 29th.

As a preliminary Lem Kegg of Seattle and Young Williams, both promising boys, put up a rattling good three round bout, Referee Austin declaring it a draw.

Calgary, May 26.—The Burns arena, the scene of Saturday's tragic event when Luther McCarty lost his life, was totally destroyed by fire at an early hour this morning. The origin of the fire is a mystery. Four deaths were narrowly averted. Mr. Wesley Benson, his wife and two children were asleep in a corner of the building and escaped just as the flames commenced to lick up a portion of the building which they occupied. The structure is covered by insurance.

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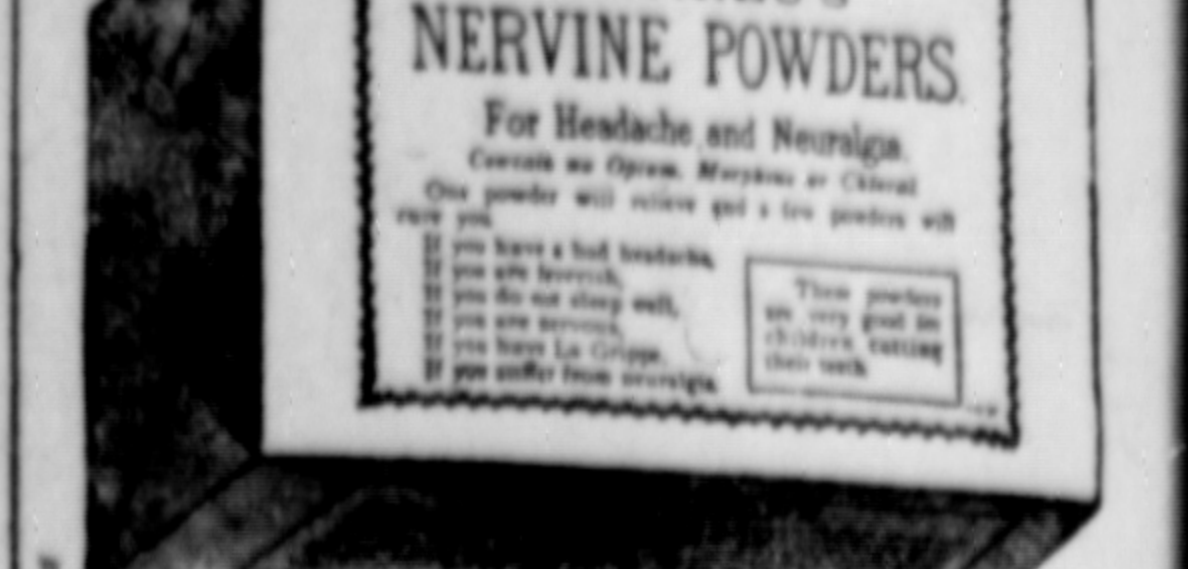
