## Trouble over nuclear weapons has deep roots

WASHINGTON (4) -- Trouble with the Western allies over nuclear weapons has its roots in a secret agreement made 20 years ago at Quebec between President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill,

Their two nations, along with Canada, were working together to develop the atomic bomb. Their secret agreement --- to exchange information on atomic development -- was disclosed after the war.

But the United States ended the agreement after the war and put a lid on information. Years later, in his memoirs, Churchill still sounded disappointed,

So, later, were the French. Now President Mennedy, for the sake of the cold war alliance, is trying to work out a new kind of agreement. He calls it a multi-natonal nuclear force.

Kennedy hasn't been clear on what he has in mind. For reasons that follow, he probably deesn't know exactly what he can do or how Tar he can go. Congress has a say in this.

Roosevelt died before the war with Germany anded and was replaced by President Truman. Churchill was succeeded by Clement Attlece bedore the war with Japan ended.

#### SEEKS INTERPRETATION

Attlee met Truman in Washington in 1945 to discuss a future atomic partnership. In his memoirs, Truman recalled asking the state department for an interpretation of the Quebecagreement.

He got this answer and stood by it: Exchange of information on how to manufacture the bomb was to be shared only if necessary to get the bomb made,

In 1955 the United States agreed to exchange some information with the British who, by 1957, expoded a nuclear device of their own. The Russians by then had the bomb.

#### RESTRICTIONS EASED

In 1958 Congress amended the act of 1946, allowing the president to give allies information on weapon materials but not weapons or parts of weapons. This could be done only when an ally had made "substantial" progress in the development of atomic weapons.

So far Britain has equalified, but not France, although France has had its own atomic explosions,

De Gaulle wants his own nuclear force because of the most important restriction of all in the law Congress passed:

The United States must not turn over control of nuclear weapons over to anyone else. Thus the United States alone can say when, or if, a weapon is to be fired.

This leaves de Chaille with the fear that in some crisis the United States might not be willing to pull the trigger to back up its allies.





#### NOTICE RE LICENSING OF COMMERCIAL VEHICLES


The City of Prince Rupert has declared by by-law that Division 2 of Part X of the Municipal Act applies to the City of Prince Rupert. THIS MEANS — That any commercial vehicle defined by and licensed under the "Department of Commercial Transport Act" and any vehicle not so licensed but which is used for the collection or delivery, or both, of goods, wares, merchandise, or other commodity in the ordinary course of a business undertaking MUST BE LICENSED.

The license year commences March 1, 1963, and any person operating an unlicensed vehicle on or after that date in the City of Prince Rupert will be prosecuted. Upon conviction such person is liable to a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$500.00 and shall be required to pay the prescribed license fee worthwith.


Licenses or Exemption Plates are available at the City Hall, Fulton Street, during business hours. Application forms may be obtained at the Motor Vehicle Branch at the Court House. Applicants are required to bring their motor vehicle registration card with them to the City Hall to complete the application form.

The City Hall will remain open Saturday, February 23rd from 9:00 to 12:00, 2:00 to 5:00 and on February 27th and February 28th 'till 6:00 p.m. for the issuance of licenses.
