JAPANESE FIRM DESIGNS NEW 'GASTRO-CAMERA''

TOKYO (Reuters) — A Japanese optical firm has designed a new "gastro-camera" for photographing the inside of your stomach.

Spokesmen for the firm said none of the conventtional cameras of the "gastro" type can be focused at will from the "outside," so doctors have to be content with "blind photographing."

The existing tiny "gastro camera," equipped with a long tube, is swallowed by the patient. Doctors have to turn the films and operate the shutter through a tube, from the outside.


