VICTORIA (P-Victoria Machinery Depot Limited's \$4,000,000 contract to build a luxury liner for Alaska Cruise Lines has turned into a \$5,000,000 task.

Announcement of the increased contract was made Wednesday by Charles West, president of Cruise Lines, and Harold Husband, president of VMD.

The additional \$1,000,000 will provide extensive improvements in the appointments and cruise aspects of the ship as well as inclusion of navigational aids, a bow-thrust propeller and additional horsepower for more speed.

The new ship, to be called the MV Queen of Alaska, will be completed early in 1965 for the

#### WOMAN'S PLIGHT REVEALED DURING LEGISLATURE DEBATE

VICTORIA (CP) — Dave Barrett (NDP - Dewdney) Wednesday told of an expectant mother sentenced for drunkenness in Prince Rupert and released in Vancouver without her fare home.

He was protesting in the legislature during discussion of the attorney-general's estimates that the police fly an offender to the lower mainland to serve a sentence. But if it is the second offence of the year for the prisoner he or she is not given fare home.

He said the woman was sentenced to 30 days last year. She was released at the gates of Oakalla prison without fare home.

Attorney-General Bonner said that the government's plan to decentralize prison facilities will deal with cases such as this.

Marlene Lilly Jackson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Jackson, 1019 Seventh Avenue East, was rushed to hospital in ambulance after being struck by a car driven by a city juvenile girl.

Hospital authorities said at press time today the young girl is suffering from "undetermined injuries", and is considered "in poor condition."

RCMP, who are still investigating the accident, said that when they arrived on the scene at 6:35 p.m. they found the girl beneath
