It was stated here tonight that Tom Jones, manager for Ad. Wolzast, was on his way from Los Angeles to sign up the former champion with Ritchie.

EXCELLENT SUGGESTION

Provincial Mining Recorders Should Have Federal Files

At the last meeting of the Vancouver Chamber of Mines one of the speakers instanced the indifference of the Government to mining in British Columbia by stating that when he was in the Princeton district and wanted to refer to a geological map of the section he had to send to Ottawa for one. Every mining recorder in the Province should have a supply of the geological maps and reports affecting his district and the Provincial Bureau of Mines could arrange a service of such value to engineers and prospectors by communicating with the Department of Mines at Ottawa. That department has shown its readiness to co-operate with the public in every way in promoting the interests of the mineral industry, and no doubt a request from the Provincial Government would be promptly acted upon.—Mining and Engineering Record.

MORE POLITICAL REVELATIONS MADE IN DEVOIR BY BOURASSA

PELLETIER AND RAINVILLE MADE TEARFUL PLEA FOR BOURASSA'S AID—CONSERVATIVE PARTY AND IMPERIAL TREASURY PROVIDED ELECTION FUNDS

Montreal, June 5.—Piquant revelations are made by Henri Bourassa in his historical editorial on the Nationalist movement in Le Devoir on how some so-called "autonomists" who afterward deserted, clung to Bourassa in the 1911 elections seeking desperately his support; and how Sir Hugh Graham, owner of the Montreal Star, a recognized Imperialist organ, financed the Nationalist anti-naval fight in Quebec.

After telling how many candidates who had pledged themselves to fight both Laurier and Borden's naval policies sought the Nationalist leader's support, Bourassa adds: "But of all, the most touching proceedings and professions of faith were those of Jos. Rainville, member for Vercheres, and L. P. Pelletier, now postmaster-general."

"Rainville, having met Lavergne at the office of Le Devoir, hung himself to his coat tail to bring him to speak for him in the Vercheres. 'Armand,' exclaimed he, with tears in his voice, 'you know that I am the only sincere man amongst all of them. Do you understand? I must go to parliament to prevent them from betraying the cause.'"

"Pelletier was calling upon me with desperate cries by telephone: 'Tell Bourassa that I pray to him on my knees to come and speak for me; yea, on my knees.'"

Then dealing with the question of electoral funds Bourassa says: "When the regular funds were exhausted Sir Hugh Graham made his appearance. He offered to provide the last supplies on the understanding that each candidate would give him a promissory note payable only in case of his defeat. I know of two who had to walk under the yoke and who declared they would not

pawn their principles for cash. Nevertheless, Sir Hugh paid in. The fact remains that Conservative funds and the imperialist treasury helped to pay the electoral expenses of 30 or 40 candidates who denounced the naval law and Mr. Borden's equally nefarious policy."

MR. MITCHELL UNOPPOSED

Conservatives Decide Not to Contest Election, and He Will Get Seat.

Calgary, June 5.—The Conservatives have announced their intention of not opposing Hon. C. R. Mitchell in the election in Bow Valley, and Mr. Mitchell will get the seat by acclamation on Thursday next, which is nomination day.

Mr. Mitchell, who is Minister of Works and acting Premier of the province, was defeated in the recent election at Medicine Hat by a narrow majority, and George Lane vacated the seat in Bow Valley to make room for him.

TEXAS MINING LAW

New Measure Gives Radical Benefits to Prospectors.

The new mining law for Texas proposes some radical benefits to the prospector. No person or company shall hold more than five claims; the apex law shall give way to vertical boundaries; the prospector is given the utmost leeway in finding and developing mineral deposits, and he can acquire from the surface owner access to his find; all public lands, even those sold with reserved mineral rights, shall be open to the prospector; the rights of the holder are subject to royalty to the State on the output.
