UNIONISTS HAVE MOVED VOTE OF CENSURE ON LLOYD-GEORGE

MARCONI SCANDAL BIDS FAIR TO RESULT IN OVERTHROW OF ASQUITH GOVERNMENT—ATTORNEY-GENERAL IS ALSO CENSURED

(Special to The Daily News.) London, June 19.—The Marconi debate on the report of the parliamentary committee has begun. It is stated that it may result in the overthrow of the Asquith administration.

A vote of censure on Attorney-General Isaacs and Chancellor Lloyd George has been moved by the Unionist members. The finding of the Marconi Committee of the House proves to have been a party verdict only.

The chairman is said to have favored and prepared a report acquitting the ministers of corrupt practice or motive, but charging them with indiscretion and with concealment of the facts.

Both Isaacs and Lloyd-George, in connection with the debate on the report, admitted yesterday in parliament that they had acted thoughtlessly and mistakenly, although without dishonest intention. They regretted their fail-

ure to divulge all the facts and having made denials to the house last October in regard to buying English shares. Having finished their defence, both ministers walked from the house.

The Liberal press has been divided on the question, one of the leading papers of the party admitting ministers have been glaringly indiscreet in dealing as they did in Marconi shares.

The silence of the ministers as to their holdings in American Marconi, and their implied denial that they were interested in any kind of Marconi shares when they had bought and were holding stock in American Marconi, is generally recorded as a deception. It is true that the American company is a separate concern, but it is also true that the government contract to the English company caused the price of American Marconi to advance.

SAN DIEGO EXPOSITION PLAN VERY FAVORABLY RECEIVED

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS MORE THAN HALF COMPLETED AND MANY FOREIGN GOVERNMENTS HAVE ARRANGED TO PARTICIPATE

(Special to The Daily News.) San Diego, Cal., June 19.—When President Wilson signed the Kettner bill extending to the San Diego Exposition the same privileges and the same authority granted to previous expositions and to the San Francisco Exposition, the San Diego Exposition at once assumed that rank among world fairs its scope and character had prepared for it.

Starting with a comparatively modest plan in 1909, in a city at that time of 39,000 people, the San Diego Exposition was not taken seriously outside the immediate circle of the city's influence. Steady work of preparation, devotion of capital to the amount of \$50 per man, woman and child in the city, and a well-defined plan for the profitable participation of states and governments have combined to place the San Diego Exposition in such a position that it now bids fair to prove as large and more attractive than the much heralded fair at San Francisco, which, by

the way, is not fifty per cent. as far advanced toward completion as is that of San Diego.

Since the day ground was broken in San Diego the city has more than doubled its population and the scope and character of the exposition has grown so that no less than \$6,400,000 have been set aside for its completion. Many foreign governments as well as many states have made arrangements to participate. The Exposition itself is over 50 per cent complete and hundreds of workmen are busy with the buildings and grounds. Most of the buildings are to be permanent structures and all are to be of Spanish Colonial architecture, one of the most beautiful forms of all buildings.

RECENT SLUMP IN CANADIAN PACIFIC EXPLAINED BY ROSS

LARGE QUANTITIES OF GERMAN AND AUSTRIAN STOCK WAS THROWN ON MARKET BECAUSE OF STRAIGHTENED CONDITIONS ON CONTINENT.

Montreal, June 16.—Mr. James Ross, who returned from London yesterday, remarked that any one owning Canadian Pacific stock would hardly feel the pinch of poverty for many years to come and also expressed the conviction that the stock would return to its former high level as soon as the present clouds hanging over various money markets of the world had rolled away.

calls very extensively and as a good many former buyers were unable to meet the demands for more money their stock was sold. Those well posted in London also learned that Austrian holders of C. P. R. had to unload as well. So this constituted quite an extensive selling movement from the continent.

Mr. Ross said he was not in a position to say just how much of the stock was held in Austria and Germany, but doubtless the amount was very considerable. It was, however, a well known fact that these two countries did not unload because they had lost confidence in the stock. They recognized, as much as ever, the splendid earning power and prospects of the C. P. R. system and they would no doubt proceed to buy the stock as soon as the money stringency had become less acute.

CARNEGIE TO NEGOTIATE PEACE PLANS WITH KAISER

WILL TRY TO ARRANGE AGREEMENT FOR LIMITATION OF ARMAMENTS AND PLAN FOR BIG THREE TO KEEP THE RING.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, June 19.—According to general authority, Andrew Carnegie has credentials from the government of Great Britain and the United States to the German Kaiser to discuss the possibilities of a ten year agreement to the limitation of armaments.

The way for the success of Carnegie's proposals was opened, it is reported, by King George during his recent visit to Berlin.
