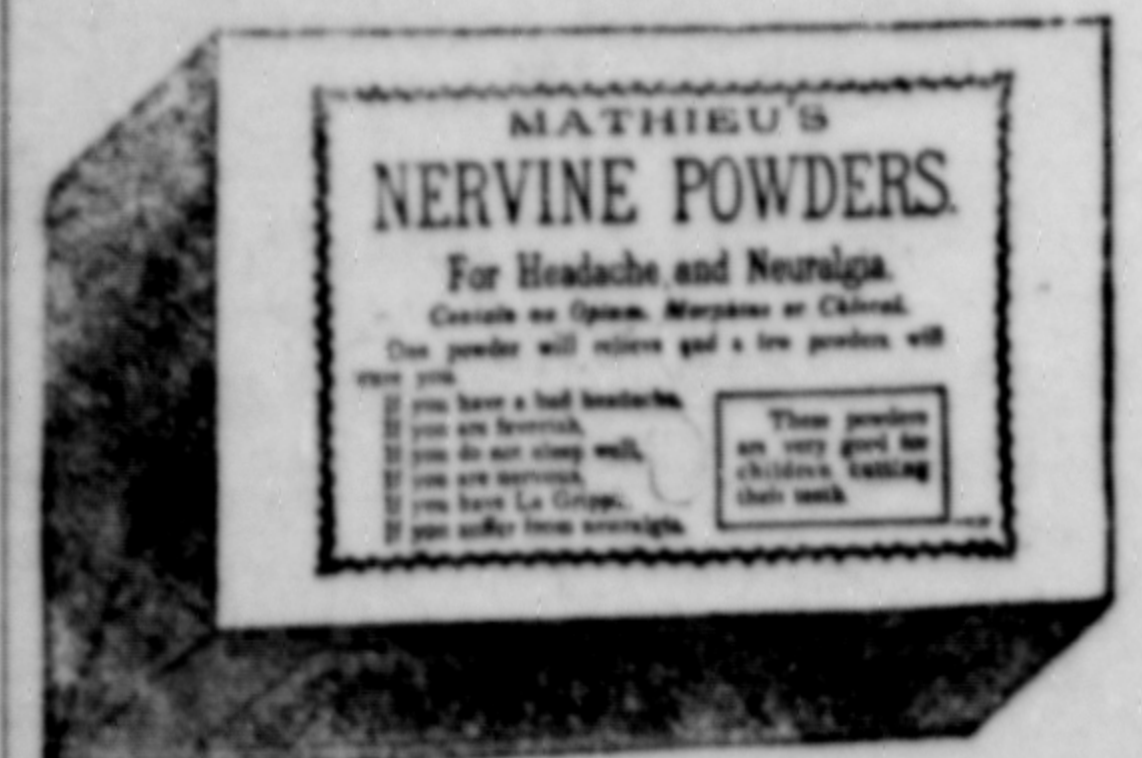

QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

A large shipment of ore was sent to the smelter at Tacoma from the mine at Cumshewa.

J. Sullivan of Victoria, who owns several claims at Jedway and Lockport, arrived at Jedway last week for the purpose of doing assessment work on his properties.

O. P. Gill, better known as "Soapy," who is presently recuperating at Charlotte, received "good" news a few days ago from Vancouver that a bond on his property will in all likelihood be negotiated.

Mr. Nestell, well known to mining men on Moresby Island, is back at Jedway again for the summer, looking fitter than ever. Mr. Nestell has a party of surveyors at work on the properties in which he is interested.

Tom Daykin is still a patient at the Jubilee Hospital, Victoria. His many friends on the Queen Charlottes are pleased to learn that his condition has improved slightly and are in hopes of seeing him back at Jedway before many weeks.

No time has been lost by Contractor Gillett in getting down to work on the Sandspit wharf. Already the piling has been secured and driving will be commenced today. Mr. Gillett will have the wharf completed within a month.

John Simpson, foreman of the rock work crew at Skidegate, met with an unfortunate accident Thursday afternoon. While getting out of the way of some falling rock he fell, fracturing his right wrist. He was taken to the hospital at Queen Charlotte and his injury was attended by Dr. Wright.

A shipment of 60,000 feet of lumber was landed recently at Graham Centre from the steamer British Empire, which indicates that the building boom is on in that new townsite.

Two large survey parties, under Mr. Ogilvie, have landed at Tow Hill and Langara Island to define the boundary between Alaska and British Columbia. It is understood that the survey is in connection with the claim of Canada to the exclusive control of the waters of Hecate Straits. Arrangements are being made to celebrate Dominion Day in grand style at Masset. It is proposed to have tennis, cricket, baseball and other sports, for which prizes will be given.

M. J. McNeil, of the Public Works department, met with an accident while superintending the construction of a bridge across Delkatlah Bay. His knee was fractured, and it was found necessary to convey him to Prince Rupert for an operation.

The new bridge that is being constructed between Masset and Delkatlah is nearing completion, the work being rushed as speedily as possible. It will prove a great boon to the people of both townships, but more especially to the children of Delkatlah who attend school at Masset, saving them a walk of several miles.

Mr. and Mrs. Ike Thompson of Jedway are presently in Vancouver on a business visit. "Ike" has several good claims at Collinson Bay and his visit south is in connection with a probable sale of the property. Mr. Hepburn, M. E., of Vancouver recently examined this property.

Ran Macdonald, who was seriously injured at Lockport some time ago and taken to the hospital at Prince Rupert for treatment, returned on the John last week. Ran is looking wonderfully well, and although not yet quite fit, has made a wonderful recovery. Joe Dunn, who was injured at the same time, is still a patient in the hospital, but is recovering and will be out soon.

The survey of Queenstown townsite is completed and as soon as the government selection is made the lots will be put on the market.

An appropriation of \$5,000 has been made by the Dominion government for a wharf at Queenstown. When this is constructed a regular boat service will be given.

A young Church of England clergyman, from Ontario, will arrive at Queenstown with his bride about the end of June to conduct services and take charge of the new church, to be built soon.

One thousand fishermen are now engaged off Langara Island trolling for spring salmon. The "strike" which was in progress for a few days has been settled, the fishermen receiving 4 cents per pound for their catch.

The G. T. P. steamer Prince Albert has recently made two trips to Queenstown with live stock and freight for B. L. Tingler, and drilling supplies for W. L. Barton, who is operating on the Yakoun River.

Many new settlers are coming in and taking up land tributary to Masset Inlet. No greater allurements is needed than the summer climate of Graham Island, coupled with her natural advantages and proffered opportunities.

The lawn tennis court at Queenstown, one of the finest in Northern B. C., is the scene of many keenly contested games these days between local tennis enthusiasts, who are getting in form for the expected tournament with the Prince Rupert club later in the season.

Queenstown is the natural commercial centre of Graham Island and is the outlet for a vast area of choice agricultural land and extensive coal measures. The development of the lumber and fishing industries on Masset Inlet will also contribute largely to the rapid growth of the new town.

The government road work is on in full swing at the various points on the inlet. As a consequence, Charlie Spence, the assistant road superintendent, is a very busy man these days, just a fleeting glimpse can be had of him as he emerges from the bush, going from point to point, covering the huge district under his supervision.

General Manager Wright, of the Graham Island Coal & Timber Syndicate, met with an accident while coming down the Yakoun River in his launch last week. About a mile below the camp there is a bad jam, necessitating a drop of fifteen inches and a seven foot passage to navigate. It was at this point that Mr. Wright was caught on the top of his head by a jagged limb which tore a deep furrow through his scalp. Dr. Graves patched Wright up and he is little the worse for his experience.
