### BIG BOXING BOUTS FOR DOMINION DAY

Joe Bayley Will Face Frenchy Vaise of Seattle—Barrieau to Meet Darnley.

Vancouver, June 23.—Chet McIntyre today announced his complete program for the Dominion Day boxing show at Brighthouse Arena. He has succeeded in arranging for a semi-windup that will rival in attractiveness the main event between Joe Bayley of Victoria and Frenchy Vaise of Seattle. It will be a ten round bout between Frank Barrieau, the former amateur champion, who has won in all his professional starts, and Charlie Luca, the Saskatoon lightweight, who has a big reputation all over the prairies as a clever, hard hitting boxer. The pair will meet at 140 pounds ringside and the winner will get a chance later on in a main bout with Danny O'Brien, the best welterweight in the northwest. McIntyre plans later on to bring Hilliard Lang of Toronto to the coast for a Canadian welterweight championship contest and the winner of the bout with O'Brien will get a chance against the Canadian champion. That means several good bouts in sight for the winner of the semi-windup on the holiday, and a corking good mill should be the result.

For the first preliminary of five rounds McIntyre has matched Ernie Barrieau with Will Darnley, who a few years ago was the best amateur boxer of his weight in the northwest. Darnley has been out of the game for some time and he is trying himself out in a short bout before attempting to go over the fifteen round route. If he wins from Barrieau he is going after a bout with Champion Joe Bayley.

### COLONEL SAM HUGHES

### INVALIDS GO SOUTH

J. Pommery and James Quin Leave for Vancouver.

Two invalids were among the passengers on the steamer Prince George this morning, journeying to the Vancouver hospital. J. Pommery, who was hurt while working on a bridge above Hazelton about three months ago, and who has spent the seventy-eight days in the hospital, left on a stretcher. He had had his leg broken in three places and it is now in a plaster cast. The other invalid was James Quin of Lorne Creek, who had his spine injured in a mining accident last December and who in consequence is at present paralyzed from the hips down.

### BRIDGE IS DAMAGED

At Terrace by Log Jam Caused by High Waters.

John Manson, the road superintendent, and E. G. Baxter, the assistant engineer of roads, returned yesterday evening from a trip of inspection in the interior. They report the Terrace bridge as being partly swept away and of course rendered completely useless for traffic. The bridges at Kitsumkalum and Copper River are practically without damage.

"The river is four or five feet above its usual height," said Mr. Manson. "The cause of the injury was a big log jam. The logs, which had been accumulating for years, were swept against the bridge by the high water. In place of the bridge the residents of the neighborhood are now using a cable and scow. It is impossible to repair the bridge while the present high water continues."

### Scoring Base Hit Changed.

For the information of local fans who wish to score games a change has been made in the method of scoring a "fielder's choice." Under the new ruling, which is in force in both major leagues, a batter who advances a base runner by hitting a fielder, who makes a play on the other base runner, and both men are safe, instead of scoring it as a "fielder's choice," will be credited with a hit in case the fielder handles the ball perfectly. In this case it will be scored as formerly, charging an error to the fielder and a fielder's choice. Persons scoring league games will do well to remember this. Northwestern League games will be scored according to the old system.

A man in the employ of the Foley, Welch & Stewart Company is reported to have been drowned with his team of horses in the Bulkley River near Telkwa. It is supposed that the bridge gave way while they were crossing.
