Trunks at Freight Rates
Railway Commission to Take Up Shipment.
Ottawa, July 1.—In future one may be able to send trunks at a freight rate instead of paying for them to the express companies. At the next meeting of the railway commission, to be held in Ottawa on July 5, railway companies will be required to show cause why trunks containing wearing apparel and personal effects, when securely corded, should not be accepted for carriage by freight service.

At a session of the commission, to be held in Montreal on July 8, the matter of the charges for distribution of railway cartage agents will be discussed, and responsibility for thefts committed on railway carriages or wharves determined.

KLONDIKE GENEROSITY
Englishman Is Left Unexpected Fortune.
London, July 1.—An Englishman, J. B. Pringle, will shortly go to the United States to prove his title to a small fortune left him by a wealthy real estate merchant of San Francisco. Mr. Pringle has just heard from a firm of lawyers in San Francisco that he is entitled to \$8,000.

After landing from the White Star liner Majestic at Ellis Island in 1895, Pringle assisted his benefactor to pass the authorities by a loan of \$20. The man thus aided went to the Klondike and made a large fortune. Twelve months ago he died, leaving most of his wealth in real estate in Indianapolis. In his will Pringle gets a legacy of \$8,000 as a return of the \$20 loan.

BREACH OF PROMISE
Tremendous Influence to Keep Suit Out of Courts.
London, July 1.—Owing to the tremendous influence being exerted by the family of the Marquis of Northampton, the breach of promise suit brought against the Marquis by Miss Viola Mass, the musical comedy actress, will be settled before it can be brought to trial next Monday. It was learned today that Miss Mass had refused an offer of \$150,000 made by the family of the young marquis, but his sister, Lady Loch, has insisted that her brother's love affairs shall not be reconsidered in court.

Young Aguineldo to Japan.
Tokio, July 1.—Despatches received here from Kobe report the arrival there of a son of Emilio Aguineldo, the former revolutionary leader of the Filipinos, who is said to be on the way to Tokio. At Kobe young Aguineldo conferred with a number of Japanese. His mission is in some quarters believed to be in connection with the independence movement for the Philippines.

Natural Gas at Tofteld.
Tofteld, Alta., July 2.—A fine flow of natural gas was struck at Tofteld yesterday on the new gas well. The depth of the well is now 300 feet. The flow is but an indication of what may be expected when the tower levels are reached.

Castro May Raised Sugar.
Paris, July 1.—Cipriano Castro, the exiled former president of Venezuela, it is reported, is trying to buy a sugar plantation in Hawaii. If the deal is made Castro may settle permanently in Honolulu.

The Aztecs ruled America at one time, but the nation, since the days of Hernanda Cortez, has dwindled to less than 1,000 pure bred survivors. Some of these will be brought to San Diego's exposition, with their arts and crafts.
