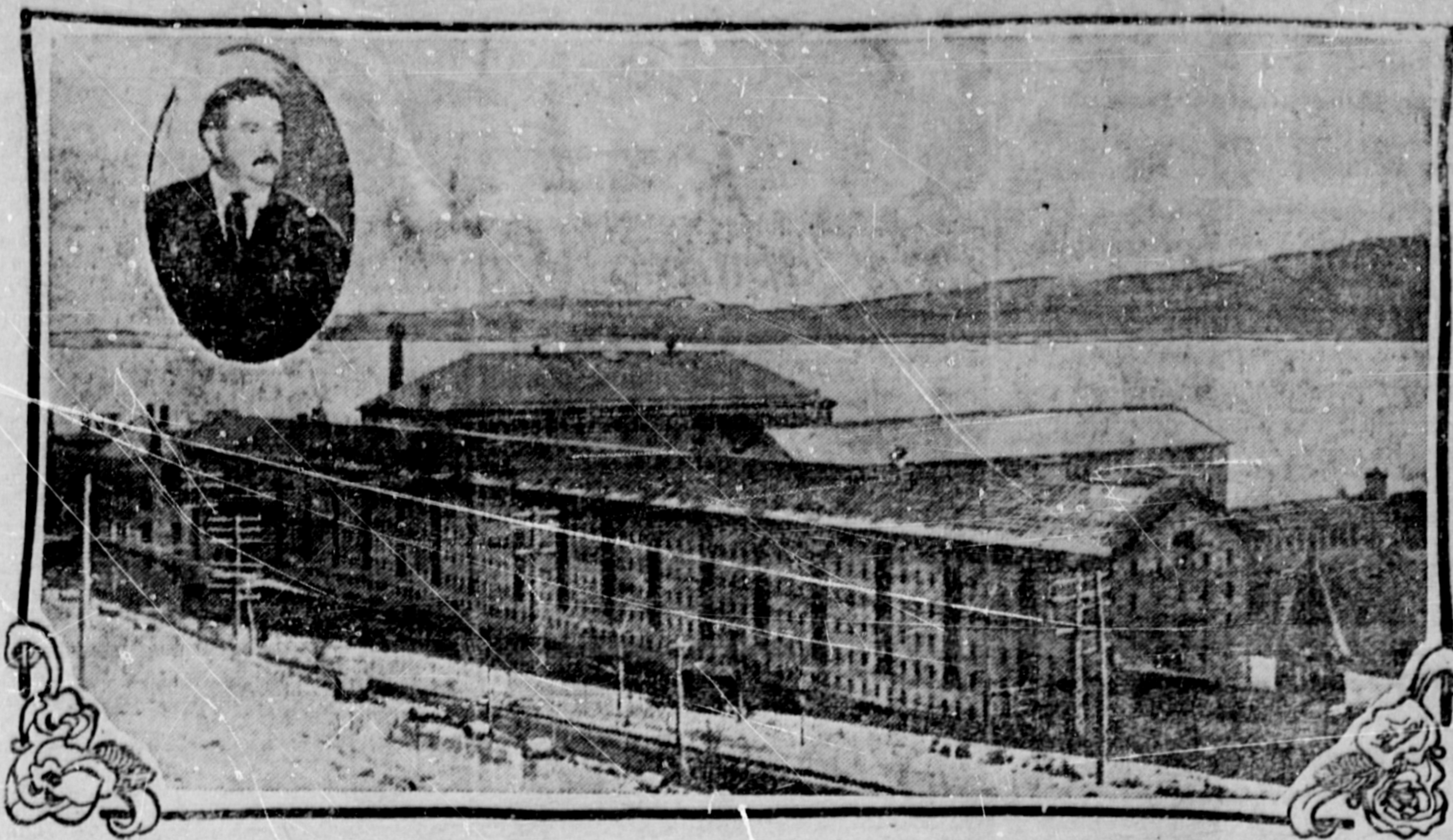

(Continued from page 1)

law of gravitation was pointed
out to him.

After my return from Seattle I
repeatedly approached the city
engineer to get the pipe line
either back-filled at once or tap-
ped in five places on low level,
which would drain the line and
prevent freezing but he refused
his consent. This could and
should have been carried out in
a few hours, during the cold
weather and when it was too late
to back-fill, by putting on the
tapping machine and drilling five
holes of one inch diameter, these
holes could have afterwards
been easily plugged or stopcocks
inserted.

My private diary shows cold
weather commenced on January
8th. On January 14th the pipe
line was tested at Hays Cove Cir-
cle and three inches of ice found
inside, the city engineer being
on the ground. On January 15th
the water line went out of com-
mission but no pipes had burst. I
reported the matter, in person,
to Mr. Mason at his house that
night but still he took no action.
On January 16th one pipe on the
18 inch line burst at Hays Cove
Circle. On January 17 the City
Engineer gave orders to tap the
pipe line to drain it if possible;
we worked till 11 p.m. that night
but it was then too late, the pipes
being then solid with ice. On
the other hand, if the pipe line
had been put out of commission
as was suggested to Mr. Mason
by me, the only inconvenience to
the people of Section 6 and 7
would have been low pressure
from January 7th or 8th until
January 19th or 20th, as, at
that date, my diary shows mild
weather. The pipe line could
then have been placed in com-
mission again as that spell was
the only cold weather of a serious
nature that we had.

Shortly after election, Mr. Mc-
Caffery, chairman of the Water
Committee, asked me to walk
with him to the reservoir and
explain the reasons of the freezing
of the water pipe. I explained
to him all that I have here
pointed out, and he accepted the
explanation as correct. In the
meantime Mr. Mason, city engi-
neer, had succeeded in laying the
blame on last year's Finance
Committee for not finding him
money to back-fill and by this
means saving the pipe. As I
have shown this was not the on-
ly means of saving the pipe and
the city engineer's action in shift-
ing blame on the Finance Com-
mittee of last year is most un-
just.

With reference to the only in-
stance of insubordination, men-
tioned in the beginning of this
letter, I would draw your atten-
tion to the following:

On February 28th, 1913, I re-
ceived the following order from
the city engineer, this order be-
ing still on hand:

Dear Sir,—Please loan to Mr.
McCaffery 100 feet of 6 inch
wood pipe, to be returned as

The chairman of the Water
Committee, Mr. McCaffery, came
to me for the pipe. I asked him
what he was going to do with it
and he told me that his private
sewer was frozen up and that he
had seen the city engineer about
it and he wanted to use the pipe
for a few days for sewer pur-
poses. I refused the request
knowing full well that I was tak-
ing a chance of losing my own
position in so doing. The chair-

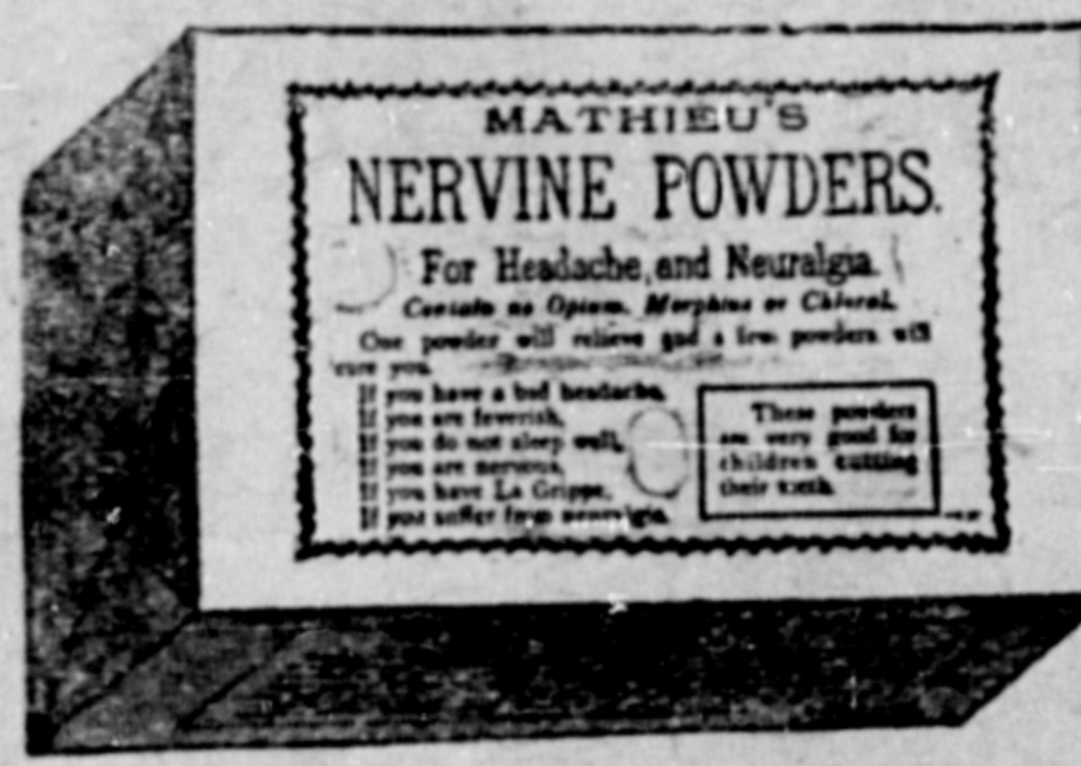
