WHAT CAN BE DONE?

The Toronto News has discovered that the Borden naval policy is being opposed for reasons which contradict each other. Some people want a Canadian navy, which would cost more than a contribution to the British navy. Others are opposed to all kinds of naval expenditure.

No doubt this is correct, and it is also probable that those who want a Canadian navy and those who do not like any kind of naval expenditure are together more numerous than the friends of the Borden naval policy. That is the reason why the government will not have a general election, will not have a plebiscite, and delays the bye-elections.

Similarly, the Laurier naval policy was defeated by a combination of dreadnought or contribution advocates and people who did not want any kind of navy. Representatives of both views are in Mr. Borden's cabinet. He could not govern Canada without both.

But admitting that it is equally difficult to carry the Liberal policy and to carry the Conservative policy, what are you going to do about it? Is there any policy which would carry with it the judgment of the Canadian people?

In 1909 the two parties were united upon a Canadian policy. Mr. Borden and his friends, as Liberals say, broke the agreement. Conservatives contend that Sir Wilfrid Laurier's program was not in accord with the agreement. If so, surely the right course for Mr. Borden was to make a program of

his own in accordance with the agreement of 1909. If the Laurier fleet was not big enough he could have made it bigger.

Mr. Borden's fatal mistake was in repudiating the agreement of 1909 and reopening the question. If he is now opposed by peace advocates, and also by advocates of self-government, he has nobody to blame except the clique of busybodies who won him over to the reactionary policy of centralization.

RECIPROCITY AND THE NAVY BILL.

Conservative papers denounce as absurd the suggestion made by various opposition newspapers that there may be some relationship between present business conditions in Canada and the rejection of reciprocity two years ago. However this may be it is not one-fiftieth part as absurd as the theory, carefully cultivated by these same papers, that the present difficulty in marketing Canadian securities in England is due to the rejection of the navy bill by the senate.

It is said that the following law has been passed by the Chinese parliament: "All Chinese officials, without any distinction of rank, shall wear European clothing. This shall consist of black walking coat, top hat of Chinese silk and patent leather shoes." Some Europeans have also been observed to wear trousers, but perhaps the Chinese do not wish to adopt our fashions too rapidly.

UNITED STATES HAD FOREIGN DEALINGS OF FOUR BILLIONS

AGGREGATE COMMERCE OF REPUBLIC SHOWED INCREASE
OF FOUR HUNDRED MILLIONS.

Washington, July 14.—The detailed figures given out by the department of commerce show the aggregate trade of the United States with foreign countries for the eleven months ended May 31, 1913, to be in excess of \$3,983,000,000, an increase in the total trade of over \$395,000,000, compared with the corresponding period of 1912. During the eleven months the United States imported over \$1,681,000,000 worth of goods and exported over \$2,302,000,000 worth, making a balance of trade of over \$620,985,000.

The United Kingdom is the largest customer, buying over \$565,000,000 and selling a little over \$275,000, an aggregate trade for the eleven months in excess of \$840,000,000. Germany comes next, buying over \$314,000,000 and selling \$175,000,000, making a total trade in excess of \$489,000,000. Canada is the third largest customer, purchasing over \$377,600,000 and selling over \$109,600,000, making a total trade in excess of \$487,000,000. Fourth comes France, to whom was sold nearly \$140,000,000 worth, and from whom we purchased over \$129,000,000, making a total business with this republic of over \$269,000,000 for the eleven month period.

Sales abroad of manufactured and partly manufactured articles during the eleven month period show a large increase (over \$154,000,000) over the corresponding period of 1912, being in excess of \$1,386,000,000, as compared with \$1,231,000,000 last year.

The greatest increase in sales abroad is in finished manufac-

tures, in which a gain is shown of over \$96,000,000 for the eleven month period. A gain is also made in manufacturing of over \$62,000,000, whereas there is a decline in foodstuffs partly or wholly manufactured of nearly \$4,000,000.

Taking the import and export statistics for the three classes above enumerated, it will be seen that in each instance the balance of trade is in our favor. For instance, of foodstuffs partly or wholly manufactured we sold nearly \$297,000,000 worth and purchased a little over \$178,000,000 worth, making a balance of trade in this group of over \$118,000,000; of manufactures for further use in manufacturing we sold \$377,500,000 worth and bought over \$320,600,000 leaving a balance of trade in excess of \$56,900,000. Of manufacturers ready for consumption we sold over \$712,000,000 worth, and purchased a little over \$383,000,000 worth, leaving the very respectable balance in our favor of over \$329,000,000.
