HAZELTON MINING NOTES

There is a strong probability that work will be resumed on the Silver Cup, the Nine-mile mining property which first attracted attention to the Hazelton camp. Owing to the lack of transportation facilities, but little has been done on the property for some time, but the principal owners are understood to have decided upon the immediate development of the property. As is generally known the Silver Cup has excellent showings of very high grade silver-lead ore. On Saturday D. Harris, accompanied by D. McLeod, one of the cup owners, paid a visit to the property, to outline a plan of development. Both were pleased with the showing in number two tunnel, there being sixteen inches of excellent ore in the face. Good ore is also to be seen in other workings. Recent development work on the B. C. Anthracite properties in Groundhog has disclosed a number of new showings of splendid coal, says Amos Godfrey, who has charge of the company's field operations. On Telfer Creek, under 18 inches of "surface," a four-foot seam of clean anthracite was discovered, while fine showings have been uncovered on Jackson creek and at other points. These exposures have not yet been correlated, so that the number of seams is not definitely known.—Omineca Miner.

PROCESSED MILK FACTORIES PLANNED FOR THIS PROVINCE

Vancouver, B.C., July 23—Extensive milk factories, where processed milk will be bottled, are planned for British Columbia by Mr. A. F. McLaren, of Toronto, widely known as a cheese manufacturer. He has just announced while on a visit to this city that he intends to put in ten plants in the province at an early date. Arrangements have been made for the first of these establishments to be located at Clayburn and construction will be started at once. Its initial bottling capacity will be about 500 gallons daily but it is expected to increase this figure to 3000 or 4000 gallons. "I have been told that 75 per cent of milk sold in Vancouver is imported from the United States" said Mr. McLaren in an interview. "Our company will soon put an end to all that. Our first British Columbia factory will be the starting point of an industry that will prove of great help to the farmer and will indirectly turn his attention to mixed farming, in the success of which the future of British Columbia is bound up. I hope to do as much for Canadian milk as I have done for Canadian cheese. "We hope to have ten plants in operation in the province before long and are now springing out various dairy centres. There will be plants on Vancouver Island, in Nicola Valley, the Okanagan, Kootenays, as well as at other favorable points."

SEVEN PERSONS ARE BLOWN TO ETERNITY

Bodies Dismembered and Atoms Scattered to Four Winds of Heaven by Explosion (Special to The Daily News.) Beloit, Que., July 25—Seven lives were snuffed out yesterday by an explosion of nitro-glycerine. This occurred at the works of the Canadian Explosives Co., near here, and is supposed to have happened in the building where the girls handle the dangerous explosive. The building itself and the bodies of three girls and four men were tossed heavenward to a great height, and the remnants of the bodies and the debris were scattered over a wide area.

GODIVA AS EXAMPLE FOR SUFFRAGETTES

Noted Author Urges Militants to Lay Aside Conventional Modesty to Shock Men. London, July 22.—Addressing the members of the International Women's Franchise League on "Petitecoat Government," Lawrence Housman, the author, said that the most remarkable example in the history of "unpetitecoat government" was that of Lady Godiva. He wished all women would take her as their patron and example, and again and again do violence to their conventional sense of modesty in order to shame men into just ways. "In war against evil," said Mr. Housman, "it is not always sufficient to gird the loins. Sometimes it is necessary to strip."

NEWS FROM SMITHERS

The sawmill at Smithers is all ready to start up as soon as the engine part, sent to Vancouver for repairs, returns. Smith & Eggleston have been here for the past few days connecting up the water tanks for cooling the engine, which is a 40-horse power Fairbanks-Morse, the largest gasoline engine ever brought into the country. They have 200,000 feet of logs cut at the mill site, and a contract has been let for cutting 500,000 feet more, in addition to which they have about 200,000 feet already cut on the townsite.

Supt. Phelan, of the Government telegraph service, has given authority for the placing of a telegraph office at Smithers, and the work will be undertaken at an early date. The main line will be tapped at a point near Canyon Creek and a branch built from there into the town, a distance of about three miles.

A telephone has been installed in Adams' Smithers drug store, giving communication with Hazelton, New Hazelton, Telkwa and Aldermere and all way stations, as well as construction camps of the Upper Bulkley.

The road between Telkwa and Hazelton is now in very good shape, and if the weather remains favorable the automobile stages will be running next week.—Telkwa Tribune.

James Campbell, publisher of the Islander, came in on the Albert last week and left for Queenstown, where he will establish his newspaper plant.

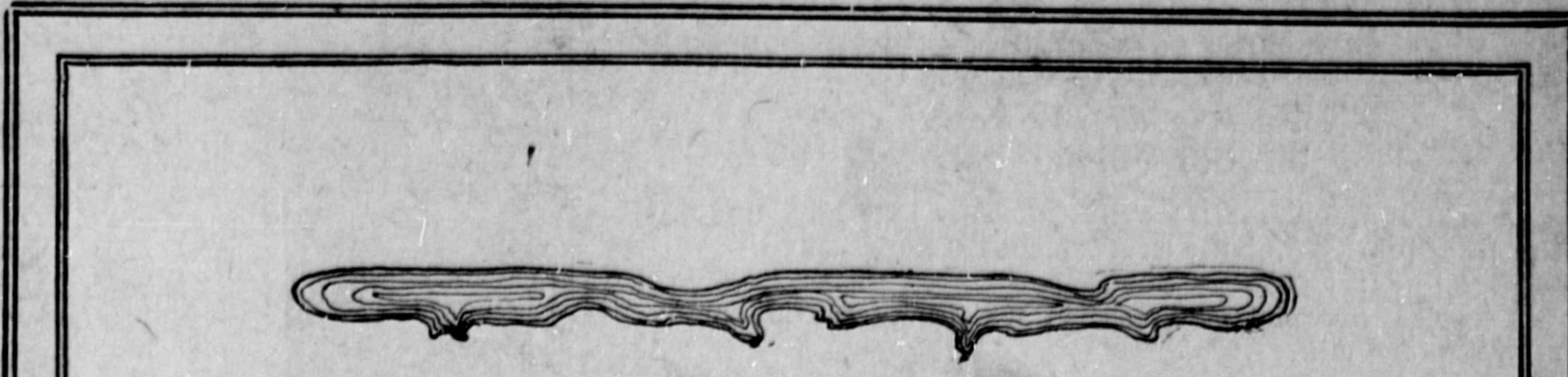
