GIGANTIC FLAGSTAFF TO BE AT VANCOUVER

Biggest One Piece Pole in World Will Be Set Before Provincial Courthouse.

Vancouver, July 28.—This city will have within a few weeks what is believed to be the biggest one piece flagpole in the world. The big flagstaff is 205 feet in length and was cut from a British Columbia fir tree. It has been brought to this city and will soon be erected in front of the Provincial courthouse.

The immense pole will be set in ten feet of solid concrete, so that it will tower 195 in the air. A huge Union Jack, 36 feet in length, will fly from the top of the pole and will be on a level with the top of Vancouver's highest buildings.

CANADIANS WOULD BUY BLUE AND SILVER FOX

United States Dept. Receives Request from Those in Breeding Business.

Washington, July 27.—A number of Canadians have written to the department of commerce seeking to buy some of the blue and silver foxes from the government's preserves in Alaska, but no citizen of the United States had made a similar request, although the department is anxious to get Americans to go in for fox breeding.

Assistant Secretary Sweet declared today that good profits await those who take up the industry.

The government, he said, has a number of small islands off the Alaskan coast which it will lease to anyone who desires them for fox farms, and at the same time the government will furnish breeding animals at low prices.

The first intimation to the public that the Parseval airship acquired by the British Government for the navy had arrived from Germany, was its appearance over the Houses of Parliament recently, on its trial flight from Aldershot. This "invasion from Germany" does credit to the secrecy with which the doings of the country's air fleet are enveloped.

The new dreadnought of the air was launched at Farnborough. The conditions were ideal, there being only a light easterly breeze. As the new Parseval, which was in charge of a German pilot and a staff of German engineers, is some 300 feet in length, the filling of the envelope with hydrogen took some time.

The official dimensions given of the new airship are as follows: Length of gas envelope, 290 feet. Width, 46 feet. Displacement, 8 1/2 tons. Engines, two Maybach motors of 180 horsepower each. Lift of crew, store, gun and wireless apparatus, 2 1/2 tons. Highest speed, 42 1/2 miles an hour.

Endurance, 15 hours, or 30 hours at 33 miles per hour. Commander Masterman, commandant of the naval wing of the Royal Flying corps, was on board with several officials to check the performance of the airship before she was finally taken over by the authorities from the constructors. There was not the slightest hitch in the preliminary arrangements, and the airship, rising majestically, sailed off at a rate of 40 miles an hour in the direction of London.

Shortly afterwards she was sighted at Westminster traveling at a high speed. She turned when opposite the Houses of Parliament and made a complete circuit of the building. Members of the House of Commons who were taking tea on the terrace with their friends, had a good view of the airship, which disappeared in a south-westerly direction.

The airship reached Farnborough safely, but some difficulty was experienced in berthing the vessel, the shed being scarcely large enough and a tricky wind prevailing. Ultimately the airship was backed from the shed and anchored on Farnborough Common.

RECORD RATE ROUND WORLD IS AMBITION OF NEWSPAPERMAN

REPRESENTATIVE OF NEW YORK SUN IS NOW CROSSING THE PACIFIC IN AN ATTEMPT TO RIP AROUND THE GLOBE IN THIRTY-FIVE DAYS.

Vancouver, B. C., July 28.—On board the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Russia, which is due to arrive here from Japan August 2nd is Mr. John Henry Mears, of the New York Evening Sun, who is trying to establish a new record for the trip around the world.

If he can reach Canadian soil on the morning of Saturday, August 2nd, he estimates he can reach New York City, from which he started, in 35 days 21 hours and 35 minutes, which is the fastest time ever recorded for a round the world trip.

Mr. Mears was to board the liner at Yokohama and she should now be well on her way across the Pacific. Everything depends upon the speed the vessel makes in crossing.
