MOTHER'S BRAINS BLOWN OUT AS SHE SLEEPS BESIDE BABY

TWO GIRLS ARE HELD BY THE POLICE PENDING THE MAKING OF AN INVESTIGATION OF A GRUESOME MURDER IN WINNIPEG. Winnipeg, Aug. 4.—Lying peacefully on her left side as if in prayer, Mrs. David Feinstein, a Russian Jewess, aged 28, was found at 3 o'clock yesterday morning by Victoria Komarowska, her hired girl, with a bullet hole through her right temple, and blood and brains spattered over her 2-year-old baby, Fanny, who was sleeping beside her.

NO MORE BLANKETING No Longer Permitted to Stake Whole Creek in Alaska.

Under the new mining law, as passed by the Alaska legislature, the blanketing of wide areas will be impossible. When a man stakes a piece of placer ground he must proceed at once to do work upon it. He must do \$100 worth of work for every twenty acres within ninety days from the date of discovery, and he cannot record his claims until he has done such work upon them.

LIST IS MADE PUBLIC Canadians Who Will Go to London to Learn Warfare.

Ottawa, Aug. 4.—At the commencement of the English army manoeuvres the list of Canadian officers selected by Colonel Sam Hughes, minister of militia and defence, to go to England and take advantage of the lessons to be learned from them is now out. The first officer to leave was Lieutenant Colonel A. C. MacDonell, Lord Strathcona's Horse, Royal Canadians, Winnipeg, who sailed from Montreal on Saturday.

HE GOT THERE Would-Be Suicide Reaches End by Unexpected Route.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 4.—Attempted suicide by hanging resulted in death from a broken head in the case of Edward Schmidt, a wealthy property owner. Schmidt hanged himself yesterday in the basement of his home here. The rope broke. He was found with a fractured skull, from which he died.

DOG IN THE MANGER Precedent as to Fishtraps Has Been Established.

Sustaining the decision made by Judge Thomas R. Lyons that the title of the Hawk Inlet fish-trap belongs to the user, C. J. Alexander, the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals, sitting in San Francisco, upheld the ruling of the federal court in the Alexander-Barron fishtrap controversy and a precedent that will undoubtedly stand forever has been established.

TO MURDER CHIEF Detective Was Made Target for an Enemy's Bullets.

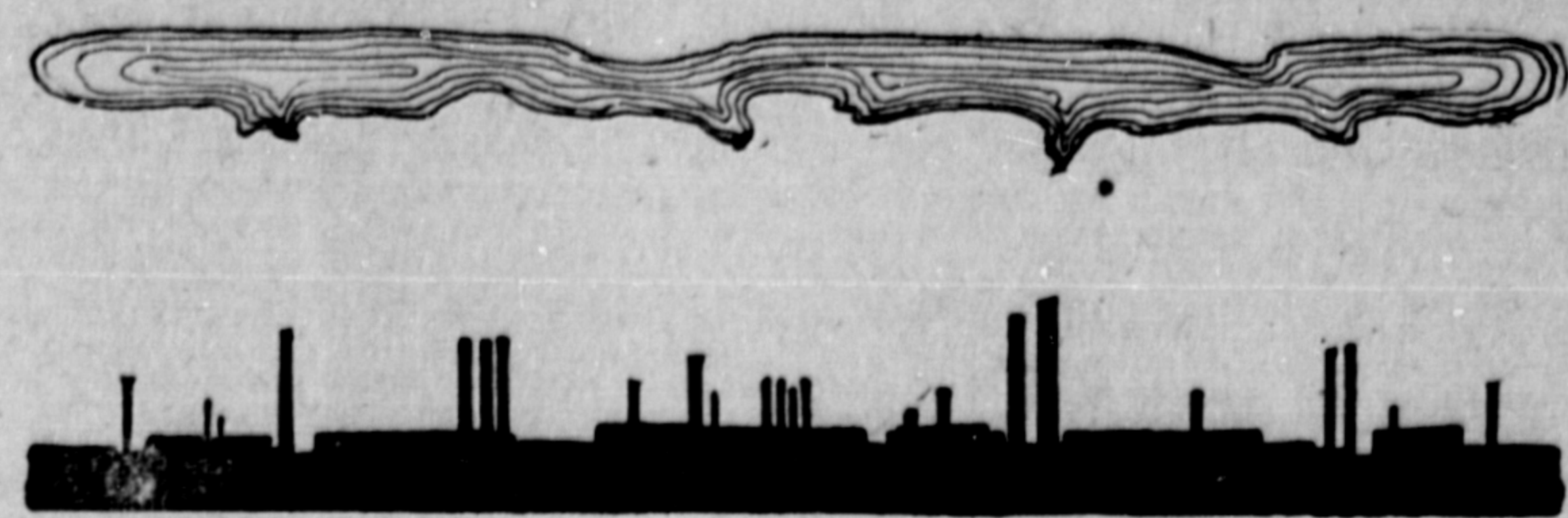
Omaha, Aug. 4.—An unsuccessful attempt to assassinate Chief of Detectives Stephen Maloney was made early today when an unknown person fired two bullets at him as he sat in his office at the police station.
