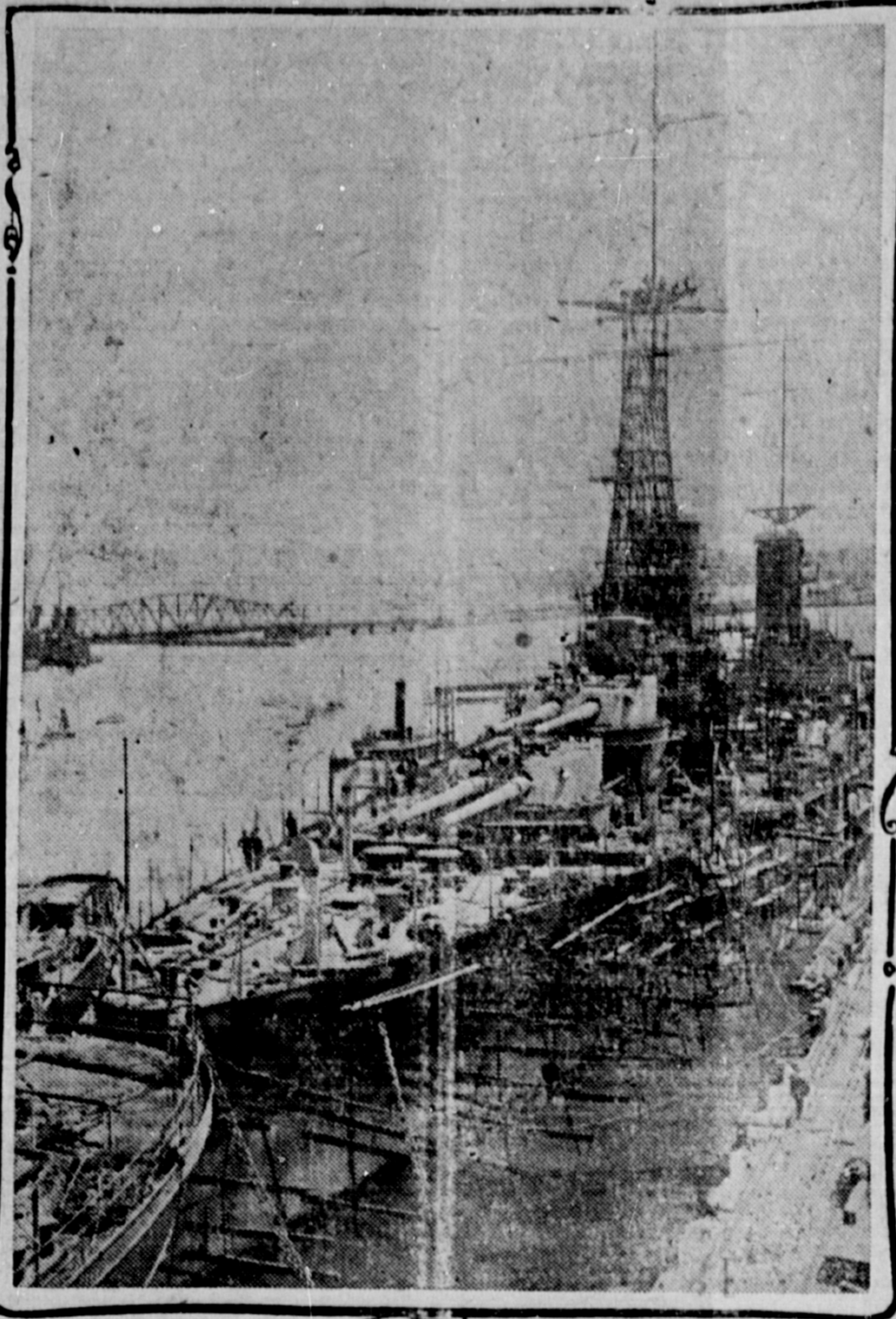

C. P. R. AND UNION S. S. CO. NOW SERVE BELLA COOLA

Give Almost Direct Service to
Prince Rupert—Rate of \$3.50
Per Ton on Vegetables.

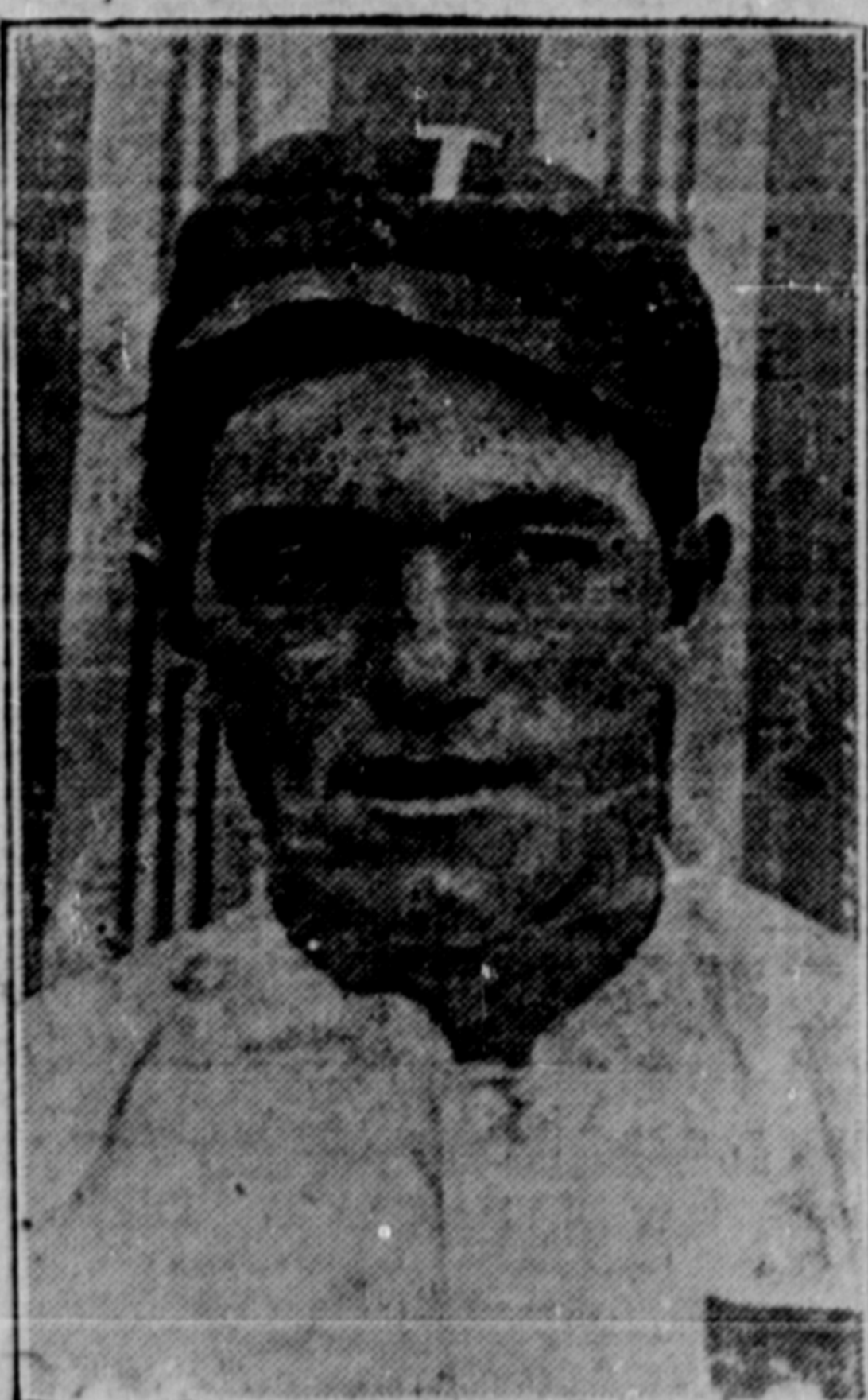
Referring to the complaints of Bella Coola settlers in regard to freight rates and service between Bella Coola and Prince Rupert voiced before the agricultural commission by Mr. Jacobsen, General Agent McNab, of the C. P. R., states that his company offers a rate of \$3.50 per ton, weight or measurement, on vegetables between these two points, protecting the rate that would apply with a direct service. The service seems to be a very good one, at least during the summer months. Shipments leave Bella Coola Friday via the Princess Beatrice southbound to Alert Bay, where they are taken care of in the sheds of the B. C. Packers and loaded on the Skagway boat Sunday afternoon, reaching Prince Rupert Monday morning. This rate is very much lower than by shipping via Vancouver. The Union Steamship Company also picks up freight at Bella Coola on Saturday, taking it to Nanaimo on the Venture and transferring it there to the Chelohsin, which reaches Prince Rupert Tuesday. Mr. Rogers, the local agent, states that the freight rate is the sum of the local rates between Bella Coola and Nanaimo and Nanaimo and Prince Rupert. It is about equal, he thinks, to the Vancouver-Prince Rupert rate.

MOUNTED POLICE FOR SHUSHANNA COUNTRY

Detachment on Princess May to
Relieve Patrol Going from
Dawson.

Ten members of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, in charge of Inspector Newson, passed through here last night on the Princess May on their way north. They have been sent up to Dawson to relieve the more experienced members of the force there, who will be sent to patrol the country in the neighborhood of the Shushanna gold discoveries. Shushanna is in Alaska, just across the boundary from the Yukon. The police will protect and keep order among those going in.

Two more members of the force, bringing twelve horses, will come north on the Princess Sophia.

In addition to the police there were on board the Princess May several private individuals on their way to the Shushanna country. Mr. Anderson and a small party of gold seekers got on board at Prince Rupert.

LAWN HILL FARMER ADVISES MORE GOVT. ASSISTANCE

expected to inform upon another for non-compliance with the rules. This matter should be looked after by land boards or pre-emption inspectors.

Mr. Ashton also advocated the placing of experimental areas in these parts, so that the possibilities of the land might be proved without a long delay.

C. Howe, another representative of the farmers on the Queen Charlotte Islands, was the first witness to give evidence in the afternoon. He described conditions in his district. His pre-emption is on the Nadu, where there is a great quantity of moss. He thought that the government should give a demonstration farm for this moss land, which was different to the other classes of soil met with.

O. P. Gill was the next witness. He represented the Tow Hill Farmers' Institute. For the farmers of his district, he said, what was most needed now was a road to Masset. If that were given them they would be in a position to compete with the south in the matter of produce.

Mr. Gill favored government loans to the farmers, but in this connection he would specify that the farmers show that they are able to do successful farming. He thought that it would be safe to lend to the extent of \$35 to \$45 an acre on cleared land. He also complained that the fire warden had not been quite lenient enough in the matter of allowing fires to be set out in summer, which was the only time they could do it.

Some fruit planting was being undertaken as an experiment.

The chairman, Mr. Campbell, who is himself a fruit grower, advised going slowly in that line in bottom land. He was not surprised to learn that the trees were growing very fast. He was afraid as to the bearing, however.

A short session of the commission was held this morning, when A. B. Davis of Porcher Island described conditions there. The only grievance of the Porcher Islanders was against the present mail service.

Mr. Sheppard, of Sheppard & Jones, said that much of the fruit shipped here from the Okanagan country was not properly inspected. If it had been sent to the United States it would not have been admitted into the country.

The commission may sit again this evening to take the evidence of E. M. Sandilands of Masset, who is expected to arrive here tonight.

QUEEN DISAPPROVES

London, Aug. 7.—Queen Mary in her anti-gambling crusade has raised a hornets' nest, and nearly caused a general strike of servants of the royal household. For years it has been the custom of the servants to ballot for the right to accompany the King and Queen aboard the royal yacht at the Cowes regatta. This year the Queen selected the maids herself, declaring that she did not approve the previous methods of selection. So great a disturbance was caused among maids that the Queen cancelled her order and allowed the ballot to stand.
