### BIG FLIGHT AROUND BRITAIN ABANDONED

Sickness Stopped Aviator Who Would have tried for Handsome Prize.

Yarmouth, Eng., Aug. 18.—Sydney Pickles, an Australian aviator, substituting for Harry C. Hawker, the airman, who after two fast flights of 240 miles was forced by illness to withdraw from the 1,600 mile tour around the coast of England and Scotland for a prize of \$25,000, failed to get his machine in the air this morning. The hydro-aeroplane was badly buffeted by the waves, the engines were covered with water and the pilot and the mechanic were in danger of being drowned when rescued. Later it was announced that the present tour of the English and Scottish coasts had been abandoned. Another start will be made Monday from Southampton.

Los Angeles, Aug. 19.—Miss Edna Landers of Winnipeg, Man., who is spending the summer at Santa Monica with her mother, Mrs. M. A. Landers, is recovering today from the effects of accidental incarceration in a large refrigerator of a cafe. As a guest of an employee of the place, Miss Landers was inspecting the ice box.

While she was within her companion was called to the telephone and in his absence the door was closed. An hour later an effort was made to open the refrigerator door. The lock was jammed and it was necessary to batter the door from its hinges. When rescued Miss Landers was unconscious from the cold and terrors of her experience. She suffered a severe nervous shock, according to her physicians.
