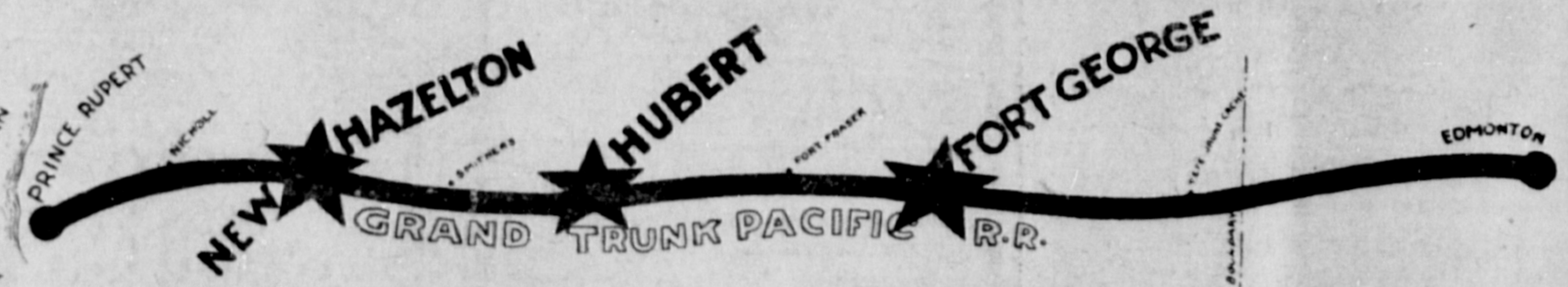
RETURN OF THE KING'S PRIZE WINNER.

MURDER SOCIETIES EXIST IN AFRICA

Organizations Use Poison and Strange Equipment—Members Are Branded.

London, Aug. 21.—Government papers rarely contain such startling reading as a despatch from the governor of Sierra Leone published the other day, dealing with certain baneful organizations, or secret societies, known as the "Human Leopard" and "Aligator" societies, which have blacker records than the "Black Hand" and more dramatic methods.

The organization exists, apparently, for the contradictory purposes of murder and medicine, for the medicine men have established the belief that their most famous drugs, especially that known as "horfima," need human sacrifices in order to renew their full efficacy.

The members of these murderous cannibalistic societies, which have terrorized certain neighborhoods, have mystic marks and strange equipment. Among the dry array of sections, subsections and amended schedules of the official publication there are references to clothes made of baboon skin, the "kukoi," or whistle commonly used for calling together members of an unlawful society, and the iron needles used for branding mem-

RITCHIE MADE BIG PROFIT ON ACCOUNT OF WELSH'S ACCIDENT

HE RECEIVES EXACTLY \$2,500 PER WEEK DURING THE TIME OF THE POSTPONEMENT—WELSH'S ANKLE MENDING RAPIDLY

Vancouver, Aug. 26.—It is an ill wind that blows nobody good, in the opinion of Willie Ritchie, world's light weight champion. Ritchie came to Vancouver to meet Freddie Welsh on Labor Day for the world's light weight championship, and was to receive \$15,000 for his end, win, lose or draw. When Ritchie was on his way, Welsh sprained his ankle and the bout was called off. Ritchie arrived in Vancouver, and quickly reached an agreement to postpone the bout for three weeks and in the meantime meeting another man here on Labor Day, and receiving \$7,500 for his work that afternoon. So Ritchie gets exactly \$2,500 a week for the postponement, and in the meantime spends a vacation in the Canadian Rockies.

Welsh's ankle is mending rapidly, and he was a spectator at Saturday's match, being introduced with Ritchie from the ring. MURDERED FAMILY

Wealthy Farmer Killed Four and Then Suicided. Dubuque, Ill., Aug. 23.—Charges that Henry Sternweis, a wealthy farmer, murdered his wife and three children, set fire to his farm property and then leaped into the flames were made tonight by Coroner Voelker and other officials after a day's investigation of the tragedy brought to light in the country fifteen miles northwest of here early today. Four of the bodies, burned beyond beyond recognition, have been recovered from the ruins. The missing body is believed to be that of the 9-year-old son.
