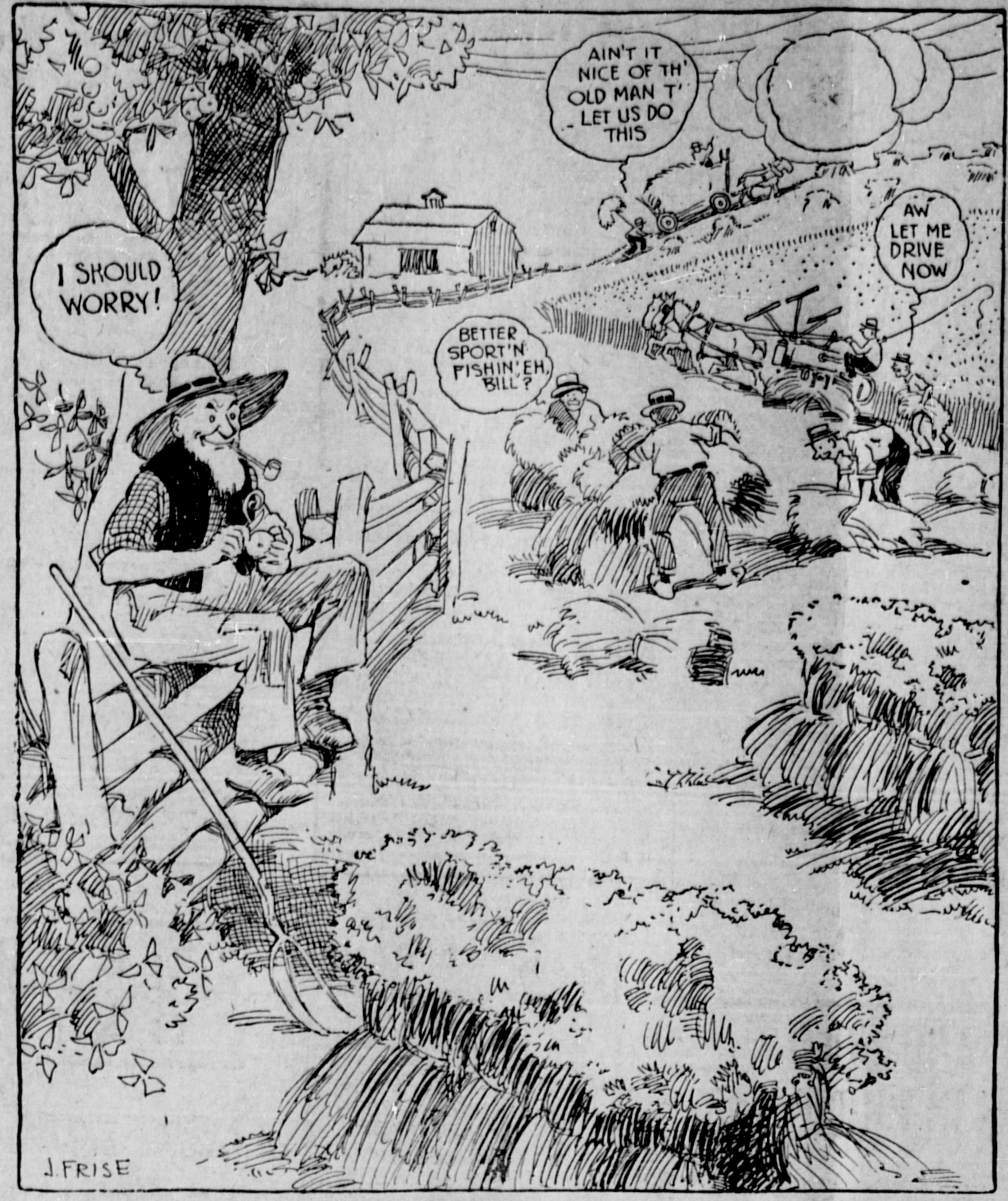

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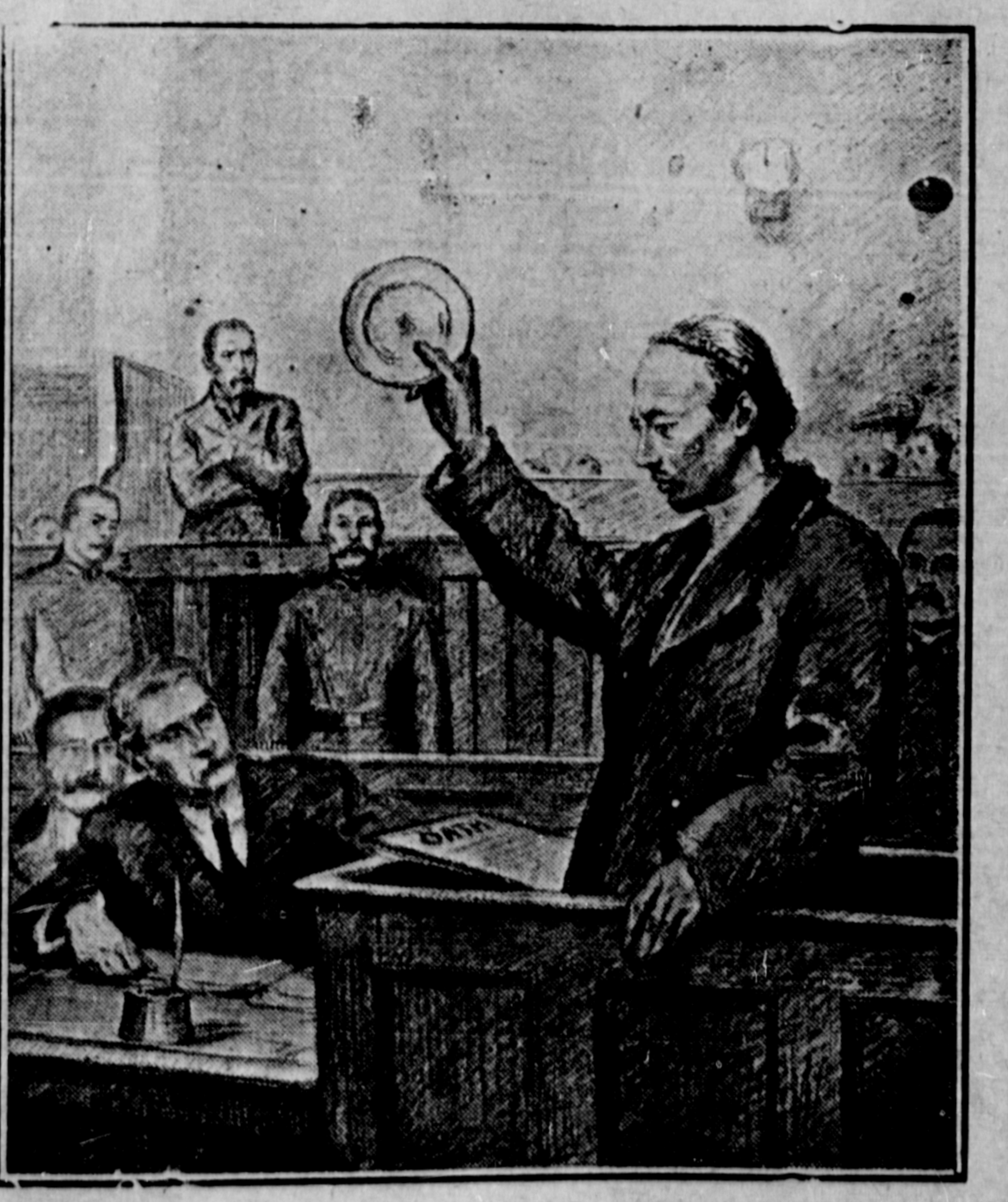


SUMMER BOARDERS. Cartoon by James Frise.

WELSH COMMENCES ON LIGHT TRAINING FOR BIG COMBAT

BRITISH CHAMPION'S ANKLE HAS RECOVERED FROM INJURY—BIG CONTRAST IN BUILD OF RITCHIE AND WELSH.

Vancouver, Aug. 27.—Freddie Welsh, British lightweight champion, announced today that he would start light training immediately for his forthcoming battle here with Willie Ritchie, world's champion, scheduled for September 20th. Welsh has taken more than a week's complete rest and his injured ankle, which caused a postponement of the world's championship battle from Labor Day until September 20th, has healed with surprising rapidity.
Welsh was able to attend the Moy-Campbell bout in the same arena on Saturday afternoon, and was introduced from the ring with his rival, Champion Ritchie. Welsh used his ankle freely and it showed no traces of weakness. He will give it another week's complete rest and shortly after the Labor Day contest, in which Ritchie takes part, Welsh will start active training.
Ritchie is working hard for his two battles in Vancouver. He has engaged both Frank Barrieau and Joe Bayley as his sparring partners, all working under the direction of Manager Harry Foley, who is handling the world's champion. Ritchie, brown as a berry, robust and devoting all his time to developing strength and a punch, is the type of the boxer pure and simple. Welsh, white as milk and fast as a flash, pays no attention to his punching power, but will work every minute to increase his already lightning like moves, and depends entirely on his boxing ability and ring generalship to wrest the title away from the American.
Welsh appears to know Ritchie's ring tactics, and believes that he can outpoint the champion just as easily as he did two years ago in Los Angeles. Ritchie, on the other hand, has increased punching powers and believes that after he lands a few of his terrific blows he will bring Welsh down to his own speed.

ROMANTIC MARRIAGE

Ruling Families of British India United.

London, Aug. 25.—Two of the most powerful native ruling families of British India were united today when the Princess Indira, only daughter of the reigning Maharajah Gaekwar, of Boroda, was married to Prince Jitendra, son of the Maharajah of Cocho-Behar, after a romantic courtship.
The initial ceremony, which took place in the strictest privacy, was performed at the hotel where the princess has been staying, and was accompanied by the customary Hindu rites. Prior to the marriage the Princess Indira had been received into the Brahmanist faith, the creed of the bridegroom.
Subsequently the forms of a civil marriage were gone through at a registry office.

LONDON EMBASSY

American Diplomat Leases Official Residence.

London, Aug. 25.—The American ambassador to the court of St. James, Walter H. Page, leased an official home today for three years. It is No. 5 Grosvenor Square and was selected after he had inspected many houses, most of which were offered at prohibitive prices.
The residence is a plain but substantial dwelling in the best section of London. Three doors away is the embassy recently purchased by the Japanese government, while the Italian embassy and the Chilean legation are in the same square.
The Dukes of Portland, Manchester and Somerset also possess town houses in Grosvenor Square.

OVERCAME SCRUPLES

British Parliamentarians Were All Vaccinated.

London, Aug. 25.—A Sydney cablegram says that news has been received to the effect that all visiting British members of parliament have overcome their scruples and been vaccinated, owing to an outbreak of small-pox. Unvaccinated members of the party had been threatened with quarantine. It is feared, however, that the Australian warships, Australia and Sydney, will not call at Sydney.
