LAD RESCUED FROM WATERS OF INLET

Masset Pleasure Party Narrowly Escapes Tragic Ending to Its Outing.

A party of nineteen Masset people, comprising six ladies, twelve men and a boy, returned at an early hour Tuesday morning on the Westover from a several days' fishing and pleasure trip up the inlet.

The trip was marked by a thrilling event, which had it not been for the daring of one of the party, might easily have resulted in tragedy. While the launch was in the Ain River, at a point where the water was deep and the current swift, young Cyril Harrison lost his footing on deck and fell backward into the brine. Charley Ives was the only person on deck at the time. Shouting the usual nautical warning of "man overboard," he hastened to the rescue. Divesting himself of his coat he sprang overboard just in time to catch young Harrison as the latter was disappearing for the third time. By this time the launch was put about and Ives and the insensible Harrison were lifted aboard, the latter to be dried out and restored to consciousness and the former to receive the congratulations of his friends.

Jim Murphy, the engineer and wireless operator of the launch, also had a painful experience. While ashore he tripped and fell over a stump and in the fall injured himself so severely that he fainted. Some of the people on the boat noticed the accident and hastened to his assistance. He was able to return home and is under the treatment of Dr. Graves.—Masset Leader.
