BIG BORE OF PORTLAND CANAL TUNNEL IS PROGRESSING WELL

NOW IN NEARLY TWO THOUSAND FEET AND WILL SHORTLY ENCOUNTER THE VEIN SERIES—STOCKS AFFECTED BY TUNNEL GO UP.

The big bore of the Portland Canal Tunnels, Limited, to tap the Glacier Creek vein series at depth was in a distance of 1,801 feet when measured up on the 21st inst. It is now in approximately 1,850 feet. Mining circles throughout the north are following with intense interest the work being carried out and it will be but a short period now before the tunnel encounters the vein series. Meanwhile there has been a steady buying movement of Portland Canals, Glacier Creek and other stocks that will be affected by the tunnel.

Donald G. Forbes, M. E., after spending a week here on behalf of the Provincial Mining department, left last Thursday for Jedway to inspect the property of the Ikeda Mines, Ltd. While in this camp Mr. Forbes examined the Red Top mine and then spent four days in the Salmon River camp visiting the Missouri group, Bush property, Silver Tip and Indian. To The Miner he expressed himself as well pleased with what he had seen, and stated that the data collected was for use of the annual report of the mines department.—Portland Canal Miner.

In the Letter Box

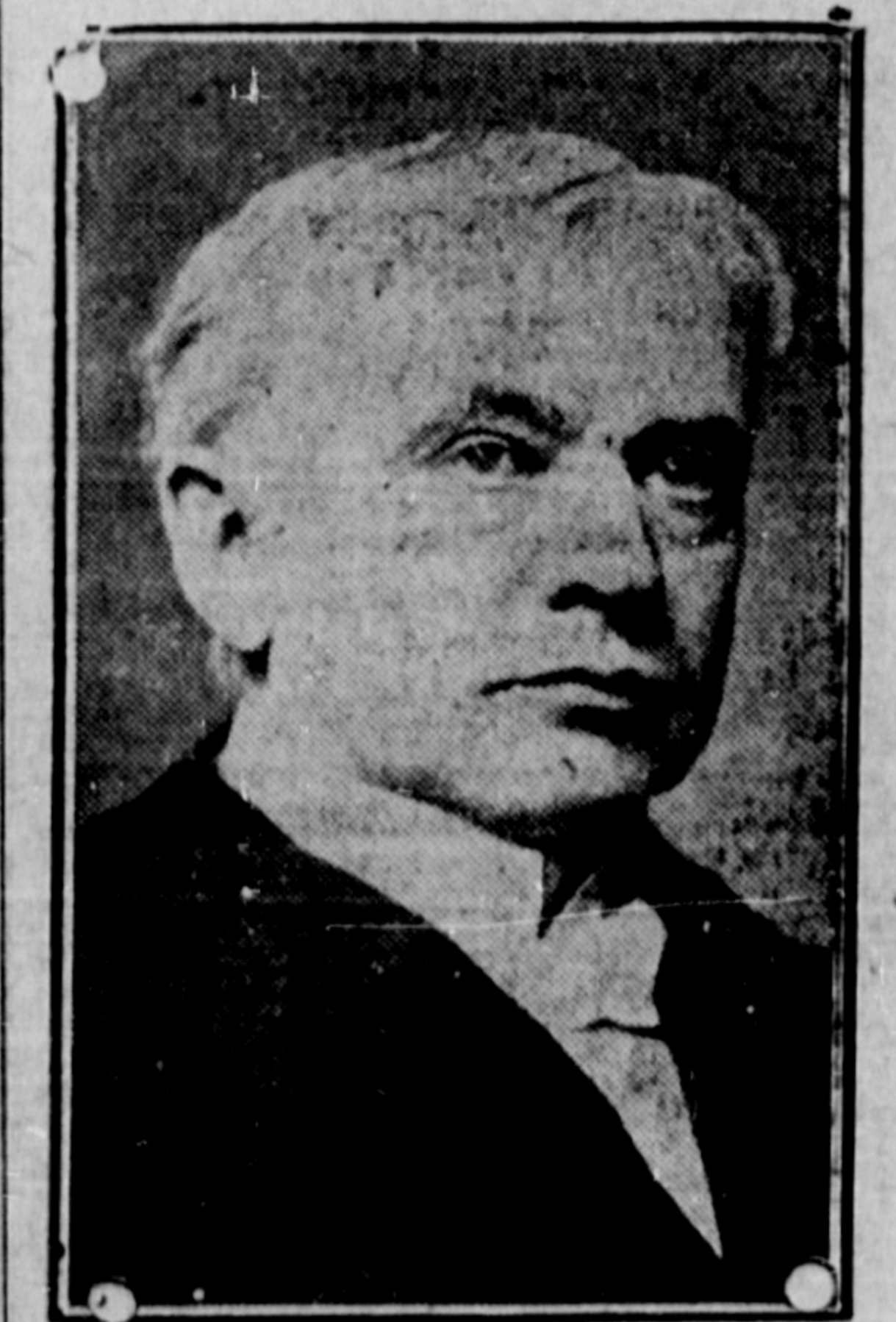

The Editor:

Progress in this age of the world does not mean altogether the building of streets, sewers and water works, but the employment of ethics in these works and in making of laws to govern the public. The greatest exponent of progressive measures today is without doubt the present President of the United States, Woodrow Wilson. What constitutes present day progressiveness in public affairs? Open and frank debates on public issues. Open debates in parliaments and in city councils. Not the framing up of measures in secret and rushing them through in the open with a "whoop." Not in writing public letters signed "Advocate of Progress" and not signed by the writer's real name. What we most need in city affairs is not personal abuse, which detracts from the real issues, but open and frank debates both in public and in council. I do not believe that every faction in this city wishes to see our city grow and progress. I also believe that the men who have charge of city affairs are honorable men, but we all have our individual ideas as to how and where money should be spent for the betterment of our city. Now to open up the way, I ask you, Mr. Editor, or any other citizen, to discuss the following question: "Since the residents of Section One have enjoyed free sewerage and scavenger work since the inception of the city, and since the residents of all other sections were charged \$1.50 per month for the first year and 75 cents per month for the past two years, if you think the above just and fair explain why, and if you think it unfair what remedy would you propose?" There are many questions of this nature that can come up for future debate.

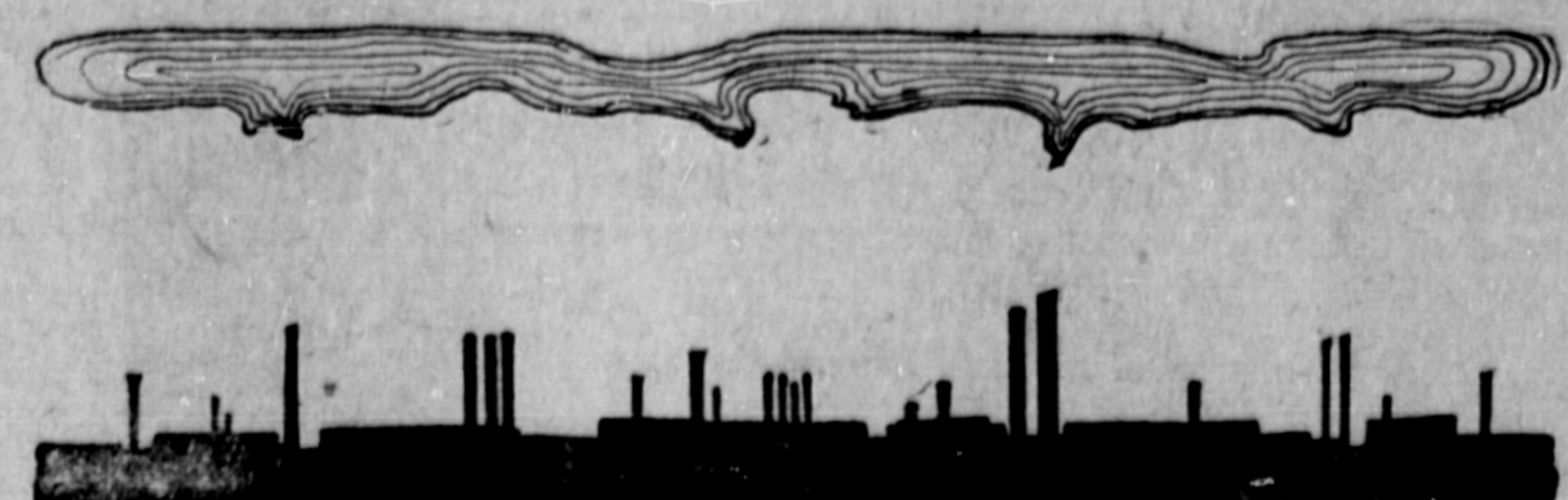
